DAIRYING—Dairy prices are still showing a sign of weakness. Wholesale prices in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are 60c, 61½c and 62c respectively. Our local jobbing price is 61½c to 62c. A small quantity of imported butter entered the Province recently but the reaction was not favourable because of lack of quality.

FEEDS—The feed grain market during the past week appears to be in rather a strong position. Oats has gone up since our last broadcast 3c per bushel with barley up 2½c per bushel. Feed wheat will likely remain unchanged. There is a prevailing opinion that grain markets will continue strong for some time. This is rather strange for it was generally anticipated that prices would rather lessen than increase.

It is not clear at the present time what the quantity of barley and other grains in the hands of western growers may be. There is a very limited amount being exported at present. This should offer some protection to domestic requirements. Should there be any appreciable export demand on coarse grains we could reasonably anticipate further advance in prices. This, however, is a matter that we will deal with more fully on our next broadcast.

There is no change in the oil-meal situation so far as price is concerned. Bran is still exceedingly high and beyond the price that farm economy would justify. The general position is that farmers are not buying large quantities of any feed but are rather waiting time in the hope that prices generally will soon reach lower levels.

SEED GRAINS—Seed grains reflect to some extent the condition in the feed markets. Imported oats will range from \$4.25 to \$4.50 per 100 pound bag. There will be considerable local oats for sale but there is no fixed price up to the present time. In all probability there will be a very substantial farm to farm trade in oats. The new variety, Abegweit, is attracting a good deal of attention and the price will be

higher than the ordinary level, possibly ranging from \$1.65 up according to quality and grade. There has been an encouraging improvement in barley supplies in the Province within the last year and seed merchants indicate that the bulk of their offerings this year will be selling around \$2.25 per bushel for Reg. No. 1. Imported wheat is in fairly good supply and it will possibly be worth from \$3.50 to \$3.75 per bag for Regent which is a good variety. There is considerable demand for Cascade but the supply is not large. Small seeds are unchanged in price from the last quotations. No. 1 Timothy will be about 25-26c, red clover 45c, alsike 35-36c and mixtures around 30c. Producers are warned again against the use of poor seed grain. All grains should be thoroughly cleaned and only the very best germinating seed used. In a recent seed grain survey in Ontario it was found that with farm-cleansed seed 60% classified as reject. Our grain production could be increased materially with a little better care in the quality of seed used. There has apparently been quite a large reaction to using this recleaned feed grain for seed purposes. Its about time we realized that planting this stuff is only inviting trouble.
