BRITISH IMMIGRATION.

It has long been held that immigrants from the British Isles constitute the most desirable settlers for Canada. The reasons for this are sufficiently obvious. Such settlers are British subjects and only leave the land of their birth because the population is redundant and land for their actual ownership almost impossible to obtain. They speak our own language; they are already accustomed to free institutions; they value liberty; they belong to the most progressive races the world has known and by remaining under the flag which sheltered them where they were born they show undoubted loyalty to British rule. They do not need to be naturalised as foreigners do when coming to our country to settle.

For many years there has been a small but steady influx of British settlers to Canada. Since 1897 and down to last year the numbers were from ten to eleven thousand yearly, and this was felt to be all too few in view of the larger numbers yearly immigrating from the British Isles to other lands. It was felt that the Canadian immigration department or its agents might be in part at fault, and so last year Mr. Smart, the Deputy Minister went over to the Mother Country and to a considerable extent remodeled the agencies there and infused more energy into the work. The time was unfavorable, no doubt, because the war had taken away so many able-bodied men that employment at home was more general and the volume of emigration from the British Isles was sensibly diminished for the time.

But notwithstanding these conditions the efforts of the Department at Ottawa were so far successful that 17,000 British immigrants were settled in the Dominion within the year. This shows an increase of more than 50 per cent over the average for a long time past. Co-incident with this gain in the number of British settlers has been the large influx of English speaking settlers from the United States. From these two sources a very considerable addition to our population has been made during the year past, with every indication that still larger numbers will come from the same sources in the coming years. All of which is eminently satisfactory.

With the development of wheat growing in the Northwest the Ontario crop of this cereal has diminished from year to year, while mixed farming has taken its place. Eight years ago the Ontario wheat crop was about 24 million bushels. Last year it was about half that amount, and this year an estimate of 16 million bushels has been given out. The weather conditions from this date on the end of the harvest will be watched with the closest interest in the western and northwestern states and our own prairie country. Much will depend upon the weather, but at present there are good hopes of an abundant yield.

GERMAN SPINNERS LOSE.

BERLIN, July 20.—The West German cotton spinners are agitating for a general curtailment of production. They claim they lose eight pennings on every pound of yarn sold, the daily losses amounting to \$50,000.
