The annual meeting of St. James Church was held in the Hall last evening when there was a large and representative attendance. At the outset, worship was conducted by the minister, the Rev. R. Moorhead, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Heath MacIntyre, who was appointed chairman and Mr. John Denny secretary of the meeting. Satisfactory reports were submitted by the various organizations, all of which had a most successful year's work to record. The report of the trustees was submitted by the chairman, Mr. W. A. Stewart, and was considered the best from every point of view, for the last ten years. In spite of some extraordinary expenditures, a substantial surplus on the year's operations was reported. It was decided to make certain repairs to the manse in the way of repainting, and on the church in reshelving the roof. A special vote of thanks was passed to Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Hillson, the chairman of the finance committee and his wife, for invaluable services in the past year. On motion of Mr. D. A. MacKinnon, session clerk, "God Speed" was wished the Minister and his wife who leave on a three months' visit to the Old Country in April, leave having been granted to the Minister by the Presbytery of P.E.I.

Charles Gavan Duffy charged with manslaughter, Ivan McNis charged with robbery with violence and William Munn charged with assaulting a peace officer pleaded not guilty when arraigned in Supreme Court yesterday. Mr. Justice Arsenault presided. On request of the Crown the case, the King vs. Ivan McNis was set over to the June term of the court. Meanwhile the accused was allowed on bail of his own recognizance. Eight witnesses were called by the Crown in the manslaughter case the King vs. William E. Phillips which opened following the arraignment. The charge arose out of the operation of a motor vehicle involving the death of Shirley Smallwood, ten-year-old Bunbury school girl on the road at Bunbury school on May 18 last. Adjourning on was made at 5 p.m. until 10.30 this morning.

The petit jury were composed of Messrs. Colin Higgins (foreman), Percy Nov, Warren Villet, Wilson Stewart, John Toole, Ashford Andrews, Boyd McQuarrie, Alexander McQuarrie, Louis R. Livingstone, Cecil Campbell, Harold Cudmore, and John T. Grimes. Fifteen jurors were stood aside by the Crown and twelve were challenged by the defense before the panel was complete.

The case was heard at the last session of the Supreme Court in June and the jury disagreed. Attorney General Thane A. Campbell, K.C., and Mr. D. Edgar Shaw, K.C., appeared for the Crown and Mr. J. J. Johnson, K.C., and Mr. C. St. C. Trainor for the accused.

Establishment of a field service for the fox industry by the Dominion Department of Agriculture, in accord with the service provided other livestock breeders, was strongly recommended in a resolution passed by the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association at their annual meeting here yesterday. The resolution was adopted in accord with a suggestion made earlier at the meeting by Hon. W. H. Dennis, Provincial Minister of Agriculture.

Fox men from all parts of Canada were in attendance at the convention, which sat in the Canadian National Hotel yesterday morning, afternoon, and up to a late hour last night. The President, Mr. L. T. Leeman, Salisbury, N.B., presided, and in his annual report stated that conditions in the industry are showing a marked improvement, with pelts prices very encouraging notwithstanding material changes taking place in world production. Last season 1,720 foxes were pelted by the Association. Already more than that number have been pelted this season.

The following directors were re-elected: British Columbia, J. J. Gillis; Saskatchewan, Dr. A. K. McKinnon; Nova Scotia, C. H. Barnhill; Prince Edward Island, G. A. Calbeck, A. S. Robertson, Dr. A. A. Lockhart.
