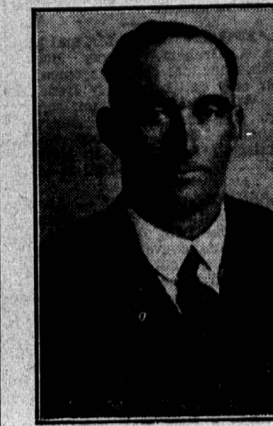

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SOLID BLOCK

A solid block of Liberals will represent Prince Edward Island in the House of Commons for the next term. All three of the Island's constituencies sent followers of W. T. Mackenzie King to the Commons in yesterday's general election, giving the party a gain of three seats over its representation in the last House.

Far from proving serious factors, Reconstruction candidates were another under the Liberal avalanche and all nine lost their deposits. They included Dr. Frances L. Fish, Newcastle barrister and one of the 15 women candidates in the Dominion. In addition five Conservative candidates lost deposits in Gloucester, Kent, Northumberland, Restigouche, Madawaska and Westmorland. Howe Cowan, Independent Liberal in St. John-Albert and only candidate in the province with an affiliation other than Liberal, Conservative or Reconstruction, also lost his deposit by polling only 687 votes, the fewest received by any candidate in the field.

Returns for the single Conservative riding, Royal, were: A. J. Brooks, Conservative, 2,377; Donald V. White, Liberal, 7,344; and James G. McCrea, Reconstruction, 854.

Hon. P. J. Veniot, former postmaster-general for the Dominion and once premier of New Brunswick, had a huge majority in Gloucester, and the Liberal landslide also was particularly heavy in Kent, Restigouche-Madawaska and Westmorland. While retaining two seats the Liberals gained seven from Conservatives.

In St. John-Albert, long a Conservative stronghold and formerly returning two members, D. King Hazen, Conservative, was running close to William M. Ryan when half of the polls reported that he had finally forged ahead until he finally polled 15,159 votes against 11,582 for his opponent.

Paul B. Cross in St. John-Albert received better support than any other Reconstruction candidate, getting 4,054. Rev. C. Younger Lewis in Westmorland was next with 3,276 and Dr. Fish in Northumberland was next with 2,785.

Since 1900 Hon. Hugh Guthrie, father of the Conservative candidate, has represented the seat. He was Minister of Justice in the Bennett administration and is now chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners. He entered Parliament as a Liberal, became a Unionist in 1918 and a Conservative after the war.

In the last century Hon. Hugh Guthrie's father held the seat for a time and the defeated Conservative candidate is the third of the line to fight an election there.

MONTREAL, Oct. 14—The Province of Quebec today elected 55 Liberal members of the House of Commons, with four others of Liberal leaning, but lacking official party support, to approach the solid bloc days of 1921. Of the province's 65 seats, Conservatives won five, two of them by cabinet ministers, while widely spread Pontiac was in doubt late tonight.

The province was represented by six men in the Bennett cabinet, and four of them met defeat: Postmaster General Gobeil, Marine Minister Gendron, Solicitor General Dupre and Hon. Onesime Gagnon, Minister without portfolio.

Two veteran Conservatives were successful, however, Sir George Perley, Minister without portfolio, and Hon. C. H. O'Han, Secretary of State.

Sir George won Argenteuil, and Mr. O'Han in Montreal St. Lawrence-St. George. Their other successes were R. H. White, Montreal St. Antoine-Westmount, W. A. Walsh, Montreal Mount Royal, and Montreal Verdun where Jules Weremlinger headed the poll which had the longest list of candidates of any in the country.

Leading Conservative sweepstakes winners, Hon. Ernest Lapointe, former Minister of Justice, took a 14,000 majority in his traditional seat of Quebec East; Hon. P. J. A. Cadin, former Minister of Marine, won 7,000 ahead of Richelieu-Verchères; Hon. Ernest Rinfret, formerly Secretary of State, took an 11,000 majority in St. James and Hon. Lucien Cannon, former Solicitor General, was 1,000 ahead in Port Neuf.

MONTREAL, Oct. 14—Henri Bourassa, veteran member of Parliament, former editor of Le Devoir and one of the outstanding members of the House of Commons, met defeat today in Labelle by Maurice Lalonde, a Liberal who entered the lists on nomination day.

LONDON, Oct. 14—Hon. J. C. Elliott, former Minister of Public Works, was one of the prominent Ontario Liberals who held his place in the House easily. Mr. Elliott was re-elected in Middlesex West.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 14—Dr. Frances L. Fish, Reconstruction candidate in Northumberland, failed in her first bid for a seat in the House of Commons, when she was defeated in Middlesex West.

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
