TRAGIC DRAMA

Lakehurst, N. J., early Sunday on its first transcontinental trip, came during efforts to make an emergency mooring at Camp Kearney after an aerial voyage fraught with storms.

Several attempts to bring the great skyliner down had been made by a determined ground crew when upward current suddenly caught the great ship.

Robert Edfall and Nigel Henton, both of the San Diego naval training station, and Cowart clung to the landing line to the horror of the watching throng as the Akron surged upward. Edfall and Henton lost their grip and fell to death but Cowart hung on.

Upward the great ship swept with Cowart dangling on the line 300 feet below the dirigible. A height of 2,000 feet was reached but Cowart maintained his precarious grip. Through bumpy air the Akron sailed but Cowart hung on.

"Will try to land man on tall rope," was the crisp message Commander C. E. Rosendahl dropped to the ground.

Cowart at that time had been hanging to the rope for more than an hour. He held on with a "wooden hand" used by members of the ground crew to grip the landing cables. He also had a foothold on the line.

Minutes that seemed like hours to the gasping crew below passed as the Akron cruised through the bumpy air, rocking up and down, with the plucky Cowart dragging along. Then it was noted that the distance between Cowart and the Akron began slowly to diminish. A thrill swept the crowd as it was realized efforts were being made to pull him through a cockpit.

There was no wince on the rope. It was slow work hoisting Cowart up by hand. At last he was dragged through a cockpit and a mighty cheer burst from ten thousand throats far below.

The dirigible then headed southward to cruise over San Diego until after dark, when Commander Rosendahl said he would make another effort to land.

While Cowart was dangling aloft fire apparatus had been rushed to the field and great nets spread for him to drop on should the ship be manoeuvred so this would be possible. In the meantime the bodies of his two unfortunate companions were removed to the naval hospital at San Diego.

Dr. Paul Gorgulov, the President's assassin, was taken before a Magistrate today for formal questioning about his personal history.

"Everybody is against me," Gorgulov said in a recess during the examination. "In Czechoslovakia I am denounced by the 'whites' as a Soviet spy and now I am accused by the Bolsheviks as a 'white.' Vive la France! Vive la France!"

Mme. Gorgulov had collapsed and was unable to appear in court. Dr. Gorgulov admitted under questioning that an entry in his diary about his kidnapping the Lindbergh baby was a fantasy, but said amazing murder plots against President Von Hindenburg of Germany, President T. G. Masaryk of Czechoslovakia, the late Nicolai Lenin, idol of the Soviets, and other Soviet officials were true.

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He said he was unable to get to Moscow to murder Lenin. Dr. Gorgulov said he wanted to be condemned to death but insisted he was no bandit and had never committed a crime before.

han the previous administration. Coun. Holman: "Question!" Coun. Burke said he had been called on by a delegation from St. Paul's Church, and they had corroborated the statements made in the petition from Trinity Church. Members of both churches found difficulty in parking their cars now, owing to the narrowness of the street. He agreed with Coun. Doull that there are too many tanks on city property, especially near churches, and thought the Council should now take a firm stand against such practice.

Coun. Trainor felt like supporting the suggestion, but there should be no unfair discrimination. "If we bar this one, we should bar them all in future and allow no more gasoline tanks to be erected on city property," he said.

Several Councillors: "Hear, hear." Mayor Stewart: "What will we do when the next Council comes in and changes it?"

Coun. Doull: "We are not responsible for them."

Coun. Burke said he wished it plainly understood that he was not particularly opposing Mrs. Duffy's application. His objection was to the general practice, which he believed the Council should prohibit.

Coun. Reardon referred to other filling stations which were in the vicinity of churches, one across from Zion Church, another in the vicinity of the Central Christian Church, and a third near the Salvation Army. He did not think traffic would be held up in the present instance if the parking regulations were strictly enforced, and cars permitted to park only on one side of the street. Personally he agreed that it would be better if there were no gas tanks on any street, and he would be favourable to a bylaw compelling all such tanks to be removed.

Coun. Doull maintained that the width between the sidewalks, and not the curbs, should be considered in the present case.

The Mayor disagreed with this opinion.

Coun. Day instanced the large traffic last Sunday in the vicinity of the corner of Richmond and Prince Streets.

Applauds "Change of Heart"
Coun. Holman, who had been the sole objector when the resolution granting the Duffy application was adopted at Monday's meeting, said he was glad to see a change of heart in members of the Council tonight. He pointed out that in the city of Montreal any one wishing to operate a service or filling station must advertise the application in the daily papers, and if a number of citizens object to the station going up, it is not allowed. "We should give our citizens the same consideration," he said, adding that this was the basis of his objection in the first instance. He doubted whether the City had authority to allow gas tanks on city property. Personally he had always been strongly opposed to this practice, and he was glad of this occasion to again voice his conviction on this matter. He had been advised legally, that if a number of citizens objected to a filling station on city property, it would have to be removed. In this case the station opens practically on a Sunday School.

Coun. Trainor thought it was a question whether the City could legally stop the practice. He would like the Acting Recorder's opinion on that point.

Mr. Shaw said in his opinion, while the City could stop the practice, it was doubtful whether they had any power to license such stations.

Mayor Stewart did not think the tanks were a nuisance, generally speaking. The pumps were near the curb, not on the sidewalk.

Coun. Reardon replied that the nuisance consisted in the dropping of oil and the traffic of cars over the sidewalk between the pumps and the building.

Coun. Holman could not see why gas tank proprietors should be allowed any more privileges on city property than grocers, meat vendors, or other merchants. All businesses, he contended, should be conducted on property owned or leased by the merchant.

Mayor Stewart: "Of course you can't sell gas like groceries. You must deliver it through a pump, and it would be a great hardship to many people if they were deprived of this privilege. I think, that is refining the thing too much."

Coun. Day: "For a good many of them it is only an excuse to keep open on Sunday. They are not satisfied with six days a week; they want seven."

Coun. Holman: "Hear, hear!"
