A Telegram received in this city Saturday announced the death in Worcester, Mass., of James Phillips who for many years was a leading stone cutter here. He was about 60 years of age, a very fine man, and leaves a family.

Produce is moving briskly at Charlottetown. On Friday last J. A. McDonald & Co. loaded the schooner Energy for Sydney with 2000 bus oats and 680 bus turnips. The schooner Annie S. for Whitehead N. S. with 1300 bus potatoes, 1400 bus turnips and 200 bus oats.

Rev. James Simpson has returned from Halifax after attending a meeting of the Board of Government of King's College and waiting upon the Diocesan Mission Board, with several others, in reference to the affiliation of this Province with the larger organization.

The St. John's Nfld. Herald of the 18th inst.—The L. S. Daugh, Captain Steensen, returned from Montreal via Summerside Charlottetown and the Sydney, was expected down the Gulf to the first port of call, and also from North Sydney etc. She brought a full general cargo, including one hundred and forty sheep; two of the latter perished on the passage from cold and exposure, the spray freezing on them. From here they did go to Pugwash, to load deal for Europe.

H. M. S. Brillant, which it was thought would remain for a week in this port, had to cut her stay unexpectedly short. She sailed yesterday morning for Bermuda, in response to orders summoning her to relieve the cruiser I-defatigable on that station. It appears that yellow fever broken out on the I-defatigable, and she has been ordered to go to Halifax. On Saturday visits were made to the Brillant by the Lieutenant Governor and by the Mayor and City Council. Several of the naval reserve men of the Brillant remain behind and will go from here to their homes in Newfoundland.

A. The City Police Court on Saturday Joseph McCormack was convicted of a first offence against the Prohibition Act, and fined \$100 and costs or three months imprisonment. Henry Welsh for vagrancy was also given three months. James Trainor a countryman, for being drunk, had his ball bond forfeited and Ronald MacDonald, also a drunk from the country was also fined \$20 or 30 days. Daniel Shephard, drunk and disorderly was fined \$5 or 30 days. Francis Beagan was committed to jail to serve three months for a violation of the Prohibition Act. On Saturday the police searched the boarding house and premises of Raymond Sells, Kent Street for intoxicating liquors but found no evidence that such was sold. They also made an unsuccessful search of the premises of George Esory, Grafton Street.

The Charlottetown Condensed Milk Company are at the present time handling more milk than they have during the past summer. They are paying \$1.40 per hundred pounds for it and find the supply good. The products of the factory are steadily increasing and large shipments are being made each day.

A dispatch from St. Thomas, D. W. I. Nov. 23 says:—The British Cruiser Indefatigable, on board of which an outbreak of yellow fever recently occurred, resulting in the deaths of two members of her crew, left Barbados yesterday for Halifax, N. S. Five new cases had occurred on board the cruiser before she left Barbados.

The death occurred in Palo Alto, Calif., on Nov. 4, of Mr. Hugh A. Ramsey, eldest daughter of the Rev. Henry Crawford, of Bridgegate. Mr. Ramsey was a native of P. E. Island, and with his wife removed to California about fifteen years ago, and is now City Marshall of Palo Alto. Although it was known Mrs. Ramsey was not well there was no thought of a serious illness until her father received the tidings of her death. A husband and two sons and two daughters are left to mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother.

By advice from St. Peter's Bay on Saturday the sad news was received that a child, three years old, son of Archibald Gillis of St. Peter's Harbor, wandered away from its home Friday afternoon and has not since been seen. As the child's tracks were afterwards found upon the sand, it is feared that he has been drowned. The tide was in at the time, and rising very rapidly at that point. Mr. Gillis who is a brother of Dr. Gillis of Kensington, is himself confined to his house by paralysis of the legs and there is much sympathy for him and his family.

A large and influential meeting of the electors of New London district was held in the Olfon Hall Saturday evening. The meeting was opened by appointing James M. McLeod as chairman, who stated that the object of the meeting was to obtain an appropriation at the present session of Parliament for the construction of a branch railway to New London. The meeting was addressed by several local speakers, showing the necessity of said railway and also the amount of produce in this section of the country and showing that said railway would be a paying investment and the promise that had been made by both political parties during the last thirty years. A. A. McLean then addressed the meeting, followed by A. B. Warburton, and Alexander Martin, all of whom promised to do all in their power to carry out this project. The following committee was appointed to present the matter upon the attention of the Minister of Railways:—C. W. Kelly, Newton McLeod, A. M. McLeod, Robt. Brown, H. D. McKay, J. H. Johnson, J. T. Murray, W. H. Hogan. The thanks of the meeting were tendered candidates for attending.
