### Favor Single-Sex Schools For British High School Grades

LONDON, May 31.—(CP)—The British Education Minister has expressed a preference for single-sex schools in grades equivalent to Canadian high schools but says co-education is "desirable and advantageous" in elementary and college classes.

"The balance of primary and further education co-education is to be preferred," states a new pamphlet setting forth the objectives of the 1944 education act under which educational reforms now are being put into effect.

But in secondary schools boys and girls must be separated for physical training and major games and there are other respects in which their needs and interests differ.

"Where therefore, numbers permit, the balance of advantage may be held to lie on the side of single-sex schools... where separate schools are provided. There will be clear advantages in placing them side by side or in close proximity so as to make possible joint activities and the pursuit of common interests."

The 1944 act is "only the framework of a reformed national system of education" and "local initiative and experiment will be more than ever necessary" if it is to reach its full purpose, the pamphlet says, giving a summary of the official intention.

In nursery schools special attention will be given to physical care and training in good habits and right behavior.

In infant schools physical care is again important and opportunities must be provided for play which is the very "breath of life to little children."

The aim of junior schools will be to make the fullest use of the lively interest of children in their personal achievements and their active curiosity about the world around them.

Methods of selecting the right type of secondary education will include careful records of the pupil's progress interests and aptitudes and general objective intelligence tests during the junior school course.

The home-making aspect of education: the wider fields of literature, music and art, and the achievements of civilization in politics, science and craftsmanship can be introduced side by side with formal classroom studies so boys and girls can find some activity or branch of knowledge likely to be of permanent value to them. It suggests community life must not be neglected.

# NOTICE

## To Active Service Voters who are absent from their units

● The attention of members of the Navy, Army and Air Force and all other persons who qualify as Active Service Voters under the Ontario Active Service Voting Regulations, 1945, is directed to the following provisions:

- Active Service Voters at their homes.**

Active Service Voters who are in their place of ordinary residence on polling day may vote in the manner prescribed by the Election Act for civilian voters, whether or not their names are on the Voters' List, on taking a declaration (Form 8A) before the deputy returning officer.

Such voters may vote at the regular polling place for the voting sub-division in which they reside.
- Active Service Voters on Leave or Furlough.**

Active Service Voters who are absent from their units but not in their place of ordinary residence, on leave or furlough, including such voters on farm leave or industrial leave; may poll their votes with any commissioned officer appointed to take the votes of Active Service Voters, on producing to such commissioned officer documentary proof that they are on leave or furlough and provided that they have not already voted in the election.

Such voters should apply to the nearest Naval, Military or Air Force headquarters for information as to the location of the Commissioned Officer nearest to their present address.
