A JUDGE REBUKED.

Judge Parker, the Democratic candidate for the Presidency of the United States has been troubled with the camera fiends of late. In fact it was given out that he and Mrs. Parker had left home for a time to get out of the way of snapshots from the persistent photographers. Then the Judge published an announcement naming a "last day" after which further photography of himself and family would not be permitted. In this notice Judge Parker said among other things:

"I reserve the right to put my hands in my pockets and assume comfortable attitudes without being everlastingly afraid that I shall be snapped by some fellow with a camera."

This is all sane and safe enough in its way one would think and so it might have been but for a woman who has risen up to smite Judge Parker by means of an open letter which has obtained very wide publicity. The woman in this case is Miss Abigail Robertson of Rochester who squarely denies the right of Judge Parker to forbid or prevent any person from taking his photograph and publishing it. She claims "high authority" for her statement, the authority being nothing less than the Court of Appeals of the State of New York of which Parker had been the Chief Justice and wrote the prevailing opinion.

Miss Robertson proceeds to cite the case in which this judgment was delivered. She herself had been the plaintiff. She being a good looking girl, the defendants had secured her photograph, had it enlarged to life size, and had circulated some 25,000 copies of it as an advertisement of goods they had to sell. The likenesses were conspicuously posted about the country in stores, warehouses and saloons, were seen and recognised by Miss Robertson's friends and others, and she asserted that her good name had in consequence suffered. These facts were in no way disputed. Miss Robertson had asked for an injunction to restrain the defendants from making further use of her photograph in this way.

In his judgment refusing the injunction Judge Parker spoke of the "so-called right of privacy" set up by the plaintiff, and admitted that such publicity, which some persons might find agreeable, was distasteful to the plaintiff and that she had suffered mental distress in consequence where others might have appreciated the compliment to their beauty," but concluded that Miss Robertson had no rights in the premises which could be protected by the Court.

Miss Robertson tells Judge Parker that she knows of no reason why he or his family have any rights which do not equally belong to her. Indeed she thinks herself more entitled to protection than he, inasmuch as she is a poor girl, making her own living, and had never sought publicity in any way, while he, on the other hand is a candidate for the highest office in the gift of the people of the United States, which fact makes him a legitimate center and subject of public interest. So the case stands and the Republican party papers are rejoicing to find the Democratic leader thus successfully called down by a woman.

KEEP IT UP.

Many have noticed with appreciation the improved conditions about the city since corner loafing has received a check at the hands of the Marshal and Police under direction of the Stipendiary Magistrate. It is not tolerated in Moncton, Pictou or Amherst. The credit of the city as well as the convenience and self-respect of our citizens demand that the improved conditions shall be maintained.

An inquirer wants to know whether a person resident on the Island who so wishes can take out a policy of life insurance in a company which is not paying a tax here, by applying to the head office of such company; and also what tax the life companies doing business here have to pay. There is no law to prevent any person from insuring in any company whether the company has or has not an office here or is or is not paying a tax. The yearly tax paid by the life companies is \$225 each.

Modest, like many heroes, Macgregor left himself out of his own report, and it was from the governor that the Queen first heard the whole story.

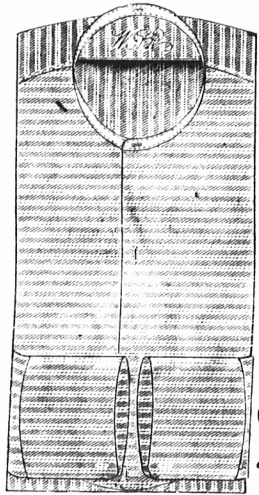
