

Demon Hanover And Young Driver Shatter Hambletonian Jinx

GOSHEN, N. Y., Aug. 11—(AP)—Dedon Hanover and his owner-driver, young Harrison Hoyt of Bethel, Conn., shattered a Hambletonian jinx today, scoring a straight two-heat victory to give an American top honors for the first time in the history of this American sulky derby.

Sweeping aside his 10 opponents with ridiculous ease, Demon Hanover shot out in front at the first turn of both heats and led all the way around Good Time Park's triangular mile course to pick up the \$32,000 winner's share of the \$64,000 purse—third largest in the history of the 23-year-old event.

The three-year-old bay son of Dean Hanover, owned jointly by the Bethel hatmaker and his wife, never was threatened as Rolo, his chief opponent from Coldestream Stud, finished second both times. Egan Hanover, owned by C. M. Saunders of Toledo, Ohio, was third in the two brushes.

Demon Hanover stepped the first heat in 2:03 1-5 as he was never extended, then came back an hour later and romped home in 2:02 flat. He led Rolo under the wire by a good two lengths in the opening go around, then added insult to injury by capturing the second by four lengths going away.

The odds-on favorite because of his spectacular three-year-old campaign, Demon Hanover rewarded his backers in the record crowd of around 20,000 with \$3,700, \$2,800 and \$2,500 for the initial heat, and \$2,900, \$2,300 and \$2,100 for the second.

Rolo, the pride of Dale Schaffer's Coldestream Stud from Lexington, and driven by the veteran Tom Berry, got \$11,618 for second place, and Egan Hanover, with Ralph Baldwin holding the reins, picked up \$7,000.

Canada Picked Up Six Points At Olympic Games In Yesterday's Competition

LONDON, Aug. 11—(CP)—From the Thames to Torquay Bay Canada created more than a ripple on the Olympic surface today, picking up six precious points in canoeing and having two of her yachts swamped by disqualifications in a storm of protests today. The paddlers did all they could to overcome the jolting setback suffered by the yachtsmen. Paul McLaughlin of Toronto and his fiery dingy were dropped from first to fourth place in the first standing.

Normie Lane, veteran paddler with the Balmby Beach Club in Toronto, headed the Canadian show at Henley with a well-learned third place in the 10,000-metre Canadian-type singles.

Lane finished 2 1-2 minutes behind the winner, Frantsek Capek of Czechoslovakia, over the course of about 6 1-2 miles. Frank Havens, Jr. of the United States was in second place.

Lane earned four points for Canada in the unofficial Olympic standings.

Bill Stevenson and Bert Oldershaw of Toronto finished fifth in the 10,000-metre Canadian pairs, to earn two points. The United States entry of Steve Macknowski and Steve Lysak was first.

The paddling team from Gananoque, Ont., Henry Harper and George Covey, weren't as fortunate as the Toronto pair, finishing 14th in the 10,000-metre kayak doubles. Sweden's entry was winner.

Out at Torquay a frantic appeal jury was still dealing with a flood of protests tonight, many placings were still in doubt and may not be officially known until tomorrow.

McLaughlin and the French skipper, J. Hubert, filed protests against the 1948 edition of the Old Home Week's racing program, has lived up to all expectations and again we repeat that the management are to be highly congratulated on the program which has staged—

Yesterday's program featuring as it did both afternoon and night racing did we believe mark the first time in the history of the Maritimes that such an event was staged. The success of it was witnessed by the two capacity crowds that thronged the stadium. Again the entire program was run off in a smooth, efficient manner; racing was again of a high order with the smart vaudeville program staged after the heat and the much enjoyment to the entire show.

New York's boxing war flared again last Friday.

The Twentieth Century Sporting Club signed lightweight champion Ike Williams to defend his crown against Jesse Flores of Stockton, Calif., at the Yankee stadium, Sept. 22 as a counter attraction to the Tournament of Champions Sept. 23 title doubleheader at Ebbets field.

Mike Jacobs' organization, which virtually has run bigtime boxing for more than a decade, thus assured the promoters of a guaranteed sellout. It's quite possible that both shows may lose money.

Against Jacobs, the ambitious new promoter has guaranteed to stage on the same programme a middleweight championship fight between Tony Zale and Marcel Cerdan and a return light heavyweight title scrap between Freddie Mills of England and Gus Lesnevich, whom he recently dethroned.

Promoter Andy Niederreiter of the Tournament of Champions has posted \$100,000 to be split between the light heavyweight, \$80,000 for Mills and \$70,000 for Cerdan.

There still remains the delicate question of the Tournament of Champions receiving permission to stage their show. As of now, they are not licensed in New York having put on their lone previous venture — Rocky Graziano vs. Zale — in Newark.

The Twentieth Century insists it notified the Yankees it was using the Sept. 22 date two months ago and had publicized its intentions.

HOMERS by Jeff Heath and Bob Elliott provided all Boston runs yesterday as the National League pace-setting Braves edged New York Giants 4-3 to preserve the three-game lead over St. Louis and Brooklyn.

The Cardinals whipped Cincinnati 4-1 while the Dodgers beat Philadelphia 3-2 to sweep their three-game series from the Phils. Johnny Sain went the distance for the Braves to annex his 15th victory of the season.

Heath walloped his 13th homer of the season in the first inning with two mates aboard. Elliott's drive came at the start of the sixth.

Heath's homer was the first hit given up by starter, and loser, Larry Jansen. Sid Gordon homered for New York to start the fifth, but the Braves' infield hit the 10-6 but failed to capitalize on several scoring chances.

At Cincinnati, Stan Mustard drove in four runs to take the lead in what might be the National League title race as St. Louis downed the Reds.

He also hit a home run in the first frame with no one on to boost his total to 26, just one behind league-leading Ralph Kiner of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Howie Pollet won his ninth game against five defeats, but he was outplayed from the box in the last inning when the Reds hit safely four times to score all their runs. Ted Wilks took over with one out and stopped the rally.

Mary Rackley singled home Billy Cox in the sixth inning with the winning run as the Dodgers edged Philadelphia.

Veteran Dutch Leonard paved the way for his own downfall when he walked Billy Cox with two down in the ninth. Pitcher Erv Palca followed with a single and Rackley with his fourth hit of the game to break it up.

Dick Slater gave the Phils their first run in the sixth with a homer and Eddie Miller temporarily tied the count in the ninth with a four-bagger.

Address Rip Sewell allowed Chicago Cubs only three hits as he pitched Pittsburgh Pirates to a 4-2 victory for their third straight win.

Rain And Strong Winds Make Shooting Tough At Big D.C.R.A. Meet

OONNAUGHT RIFLE RANGES, South March, Ont., Aug. 11—(CP)—Driving rain and strong winds produced near impossible shooting conditions today for a large field of marksmen who kept to their firing mounds in the third day of Dominion of Canada Rifle Association competition here.

In today's feature match—the Macdonald—two riflemen tied for first place. They were: R.C. M.P. Supp. D.L. McMillan of Fredericton, N.B., and W.O. E.E. Wright of Stanbridge East, Que. Each scored 121 of a possible 125 on the difficult 300 and 600-yard ranges.

They will shoot off Thursday for the silver and bronze D.C.R.A. medals, first and second place awards.

Heavy rain taxed both skill and endurance of the marksmen, firing from cold, soaking mounds. Wet ammunition brought unpredictable changes in the elevation of shots and the riflemen with no help from heavy, rain-soaked wind-flags could only guess at wind velocity.

Elimination shoot-offs to break first place ties for two trophies—the Tilton prize and the Patterson cup of the Bankers' Match—were won by a pair of youthful snipers, both newcomers in heavy-bore competition.

A reserve force soldier from Winnipeg, Pte. P.E. Gutnick, 21, won out over three crack marksmen to carry off the coveted Patterson cup. All four posted high 95 scores in the Bankers' Match Tuesday on the 300 and 600-yard ranges.

Pte. Gutnick fired five successive bulls eyes at 600 yards in the shoot-offs to clinch the prize.

Another young marksman, 24-year-old Gilmour S. Boa of Toronto, won an elimination shoot-off over four others, to take the \$500 souvenir prize in the Tilton Match. Gordon Oakes, a Hamilton, Ont. cadet, won the gold medal in the Gooding Junior competition. The Gooding silver medal was won by Jack MacNeil of Vancouver and the bronze medal by a Calgary cadet, C. C. Dick.

Four snipers tied for third place in the Macdonald Match with scores of 119 of a possible 125. They included leading writer R. W. Saturday of the R.C.N. at Halifax and Maj. A. F. Gormley, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Five other marksmen ended the close-fought Macdonald competition with scores of 118. They included C. Sgt. B. L. Runway, Lawrenceville, N. S., Cpl. P. L. Landrigan, Charlottetown, P. E. I.

Sunday and Sport

TORONTO, Aug. 11—When the General Council of The United Church of Canada meets in Vancouver in September, one of the recommendations coming before that body will deal with observance of the Lord's Day. A commission appointed by the Board of Evangelism and Social Service at the request of the Twelfth General Council, will present a lengthy report on the meaning and significance of the Lord's Day and some recommendations for its observance.

One of the recommendations urges our leaders in social and recreation that while everything possible should be done to increase the facilities for healthy public recreation, nevertheless Sunday should be kept free from elaborately organized sports and games. The principle should be to take every possible means to enable people to get good recreation in their own way, but not to gain large crowds of spectators and to impose the minimum of work or other.

A second recommendation of the Commission calls upon "Governments, trade unions, farm organizations, employer's groups and all who guide public opinion to consider well the seriousness of danger that Sunday may become simply another day for most people."

The Commission calls upon "congregations to make large and better provision for Sunday fellowship activities on Church premises, especially in congested housing areas; and further that these activities be of such an educational and religious nature as shall be in keeping with the spirit of the Lord's Day and at the same time they should be made appealing to youth who have no regular activities on Sunday afternoon and evening."

Commendation is given by the Commission to "leaders in youth camps, fresh air camps and similar regular part of the program of the Lord's Day."
