TOMORROW morning the South African Veterans will attend a service at the Kirk in memory of their departed comrades. Chaplain Fullerton will officiate. After service they will repair to the soldiers monument and deposit a wreath at its base. A short program will then be carried out. The first and last verses of "God be with you till we meet again" will be sung—this being the hymn sung by Miss Florrie Earle at the last service at the Kirk before the 1st Contingent left for the war. Chaplain Fullerton will deliver a short address and the last post will be sounded. Capt. Watts will direct the music.
