UNPARALLELED SPLENDOR OF LONDON'S ROYAL WEDDING

Line of March Thronged With More Than a Million People. Westminster Abbey Hidden Under Glittering Decorations. Ceremony Performed by Archbishop of Canterbury, Assisted by Britain's Most Distinguished Prelates. Royal Couple Cheered by Million Throats as They Left the Abbey.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, April 26.—A burst of sun through the heavy sky which had drizzled all morning shone down like a final blessing upon the romance of Albert, Duke of York, and his radiant bride Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, as they emerged from Westminster Abbey man and wife today. A short time before they repeated in the historic sanctuary the vows of the revised and shortened marriage service in the New England prayer book. As they came out a multitude of throats shouted their cheers and blessings.

- PRELIMINARY SCENES. The enthusiasm of the Londoners manifested itself long before the hour set for the ceremony. In Parliament Square, flanking and facing the Abbey, along both sides of Whitehall to the Horse Guards Arch, were deep lines of people, not as congested at that hour as they would have been in better weather, or as they became later in the morning, but enough to show the real popularity of the Royal event. Lines of police were in front of the sidewalks, their oil-skin capes glistening with rain.

Very hearty cheers greeted them but the people were almost too crowded to breathe, the carriages were closed and it required all one's attention to catch the briefest glimpse of the occupants.

In the third carriage in the procession came the bridegroom and his two brothers, the Prince of Wales and Prince Henry. The Prince of Wales was looking at the bride with great interest at the cheering crowds.

Asbestos Miners Create Disturbance at Thetford Mines

Revenue Lost by Increased Duties On Cigarettes

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, April 26.—Increasing the duty on cigarettes through the budget resolutions and amendments of 1922 shows a direct loss to the Dominion treasury of more than three and a half million dollars gross, according to a statement issued today by C. B. Richardson, Secretary Treasurer of the Dominion Cigar and Tobacco Association. The loss is reduced somewhat by the increased consumption of cigars and tobacco.

British Shipbuilders Ousting Canada

(Canadian Press.) MONTREAL, April 26.—England is ousting Canadian ship building companies from their own market owing to the big variation amounting to forty per cent in costs of production. The result is there will not be much ship building in Canada for some time. These are the conclusions reached by Arthur R. Gillham managing director of Canadian Vickers, Limited, just returned from England. Great Britain is building about thirty ships for the Canadian Great Lakes at figures impossible to approach in Canada, largely because the skilled mechanics in England is getting approximately half what is paid on this side of the water.
