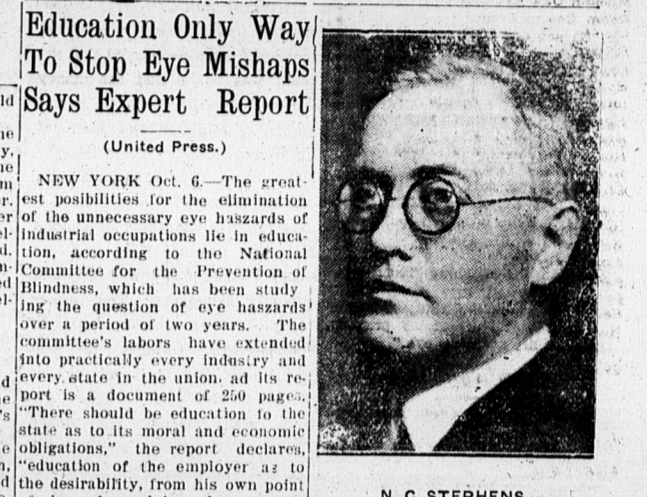

AUSTRIA TO ADOPT SHILLING AS COIN
VIENNA, Oct. 4.—Shilling currency will be introduced in Austria January 1, 1925, to replace the crown. After that date it will be illegal to quote prices or keep accounts in other than the new money. The shilling is to be issued in silver and paper and will be worth 10,000 of the present crowns.
