Apps Defeated At Polls Starts Maple Leafs On Way To 2-1 Victory

(By Jack Calder, Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, March 26.—(CP)—Defeat in the Dominion Election failed to interfere with the hockey playing ability of Sylvanus Apps and he started Toronto Maple Leafs on the way to a 2-1 victory over Detroit Red Wings tonight as their semi-final round started in National League playoffs for the Stanley Cup.

The stainless knight, who was beaten by a narrow margin as National Government candidate in Brant riding at the polls today, scored the first Toronto goal midway through the game and was close many more times.

Apps took a pass out from Nick Metz while Carl Ebbie Goodfellow of the Wings was serving a penalty and whacked it past goalie Tiny Thompson from close range.

With both sides on the offensive almost all the way, the Wings made a close at the finish. Sweeney Schriener sped in to sink the second Toronto goal less than a minute after the third period started and then trouble started.

Conny Brown raged in to sink the Detroit goal with ten minutes to play as goalie Turk Broda tried to sit on the puck. Byron (Butch) McDonald had laid the puck at Broda's feet on what was intended to be a pass on what was intended to be the Toronto defence.

Moments later, as the Leafs resumed their assault, McDonald raced away and rounded the defence, to hit a goal post on a shot that fooled Broda completely.

The second period was replete with penalties and included a fist fight between Goodfellow and Bingo Kampan, of the Leafs.

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New York Rangers Down Boston Bruins 1-0 By Sensational 3rd Period Shot

(By Sydney Gruson Canadian Press Staff Writer) NEW YORK, March 26.—(CP)—After more than 2 1/2 periods of heavy-slogging, scoreless play, Murray Patrick fired home a 33-foot shot that gave New York Rangers a 1-0 victory over Boston Bruins tonight and sent the teams on to Boston for the next clash with their best of seven Stanley Cup semi-final tied at two games apiece.

Frankie Brimsek the Bruins' great goalie, had turned aside some 20 shots, a half dozen of the saves bordering on the miraculous before Patrick's rising drive came through the players grouped at the goal mouth and went by before Brimsek moved. The goal came at 10:40 of the third period and the Rangers had an easy job protecting the slim margin.

The season's biggest crowd here—16,504 standing and seated—watched the closest and hardest struggle of the series and cheered madly as the Rangers maintained their home-ice edge over the champions. The Bruins have won only once, last season, in 11 games on New York ice in the last two years.
