Acreege May Be Reduced 10 Percent

Mr. S. G. Peppin, Chief Inspector of Seed Certification for Prince Edward Island, stated yesterday that indications point to a possible reduction of ten per cent in the acreage entered for seed potato inspection this year as compared with 1946.

The acreage entered in 1946 was the highest of all time since the inception of inspection work back in 1918 when only a few acres, scattered over the Province, were planted to seed potatoes.

Exports from the 1946 crop of seed potatoes from the Province were in excess of two and a half million bushels, Mr. Peppin stated, adding, that this was exclusive of possibly two million or more bushels which went to the United Kingdom for home consumption.

The printing of the application forms for seed potato inspection, he stated, has been delayed but it is expected that they will be in the mail early next week.

and progressive re-adjustment of the administration of the church, and another recommending that the special administrative needs committee be continued, were passed.

The assembly heard Mr. Miller's explanation of the report and deferred debate on its recommendations until Monday.

Pointing to the alarming increase in the rate of divorce, Mr. C. L. Cowan of Hamilton claimed that one out of three marriages now end in the divorce court. Pointing to an "alarming growth" in juvenile delinquency, he said that certain moving pictures were immoral and detrimental to youth.

He also suggested the board look into the reason why clergymen of "one branch of the church" were exempted from the income tax.

J. S. Mitchell, elder from Montreal, supported the board's recommendation for special preaching missions or evangelistic campaigns.

Rev. Robert Good, Ottawa, suggested that if aid is to be sent to British or European peoples by churches, it should be done through existing organizations. Mr. Clarence Pitts of Ottawa asked that information be obtained from people on the other side as to what to send and where to send it.

During the afternoon sessions the assembly decided to forward greetings to the Presbyterian Church in South Africa on the occasion of its golden jubilee. Greetings were also sent to the American Presbyterian Church.

CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

In the fourth of his series of addresses at Central Christian church, Dr. C. H. Phillips, of Calgary, Alberta, offered an explanation of the fact that the simple institution known as the church revealed in the New Testament is not found in post-apostolic history.

He declared that the church founded by Jesus was eclipsed by the rise of an institution foreign in form and spirit to the one known to the apostles.

Dr. Phillips then drew attention in contrast to the elements in the church of the second and later centuries in those of the church portrayed in those of the church.

He noted that human philosophy replaced the simple statements of Scriptures as the basic teaching of the church. The simple personal belief in Jesus Christ, said Dr. Phillips, was eclipsed and substituted for the various philosophical formulas of faith known as "creeds."

Besides these departures, the speaker declared, is seen the rise and establishment of a "sacerdotalism." This latter "ism," Dr. Phillips explained, is the substitution for the fraternal equality of the members common to the New Testament church of a class system in which the "clergy" were distinguished from the "laity."

These "isms," Mr. Phillips affirmed, laid the foundation for the evolution of the ultimate alien institution eclipsing the church revealed in the New Testament.

In further developing his proposition, Dr. Phillips called attention to numerous characteristics found in the new institution foreign to the New Testament. Membership, he said, which had been restricted to adult, repentant, immersed believers in the apostolic age was made possible to unbelieving infants and others who had been "sprinkled" rather than immersed.

The simple New Testament of clergy and organization, Mr. Phillips declared, was replaced by a complicated executive system and an unwieldy organization robbing the local churches of their independence and reducing them into a centralized ecclesiastical system of government, patterned after that of the Roman empire.

The speaker declared that these radical substitutions produced a life foreign to the simple reformed life and practice of the church of the apostolic age. In place of the ordinary every day practice of Christian behavior expressing the religion of Christ, ritualistic forms on special days were made to express one's relation to God, said Mr. Phillips.

In summarizing his address, Dr. Phillips called attention to the admitted distinction of the post-apostolic institution in its assumption of names and terms nowhere found in the Scriptures. These terms were applied to individual members and to the institution itself. "However," said Mr. Phillips, "God had not left himself without witness. Down through the centuries in which this alien institution dominated the lives of men there were those who were true to the New Testament ideal. These provided 'glimpses' of the church as God knew it and had founded it.

Mr. Phillips promised that the next study would deal with some of the best and movements endeavoring to keep alive the church revealed in the New Testament in an age of apostasy.

Departmental Changes In Eastern Fisheries Areas Announced By Minister

OTTAWA, June 5.—Fisheries Minister Bridges announced a re-adjustment of departmental administrative areas in the Eastern Fisheries Division, or Maritime Provinces, with the principal change the establishment of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island as individual "regions," each in immediate charge of a regional supervisor and each divided, in turn, into several unit areas in charge of senior inspectors. The three regional supervisors will be under the general direction of the chief supervisor for the division but Mr. Bridges said it was believed that the new plan of having an officer in charge in each province would make for more effective handling of regional problems.

Coupled with the readjustment of areas, Mr. Bridges said, there has been promotion and reassignment of a number of the department's officers in the Maritimes and with a view to strengthening the field force 85 new inspectors have also been selected and are being placed at various points. The new appointees, all of them veterans, recently completed a special course of fisheries training which all candidates for these positions were required to take. A similar course was recently given in British Columbia where some 40 new officers are also being appointed as another step in the programme of departmental reorganization, both in the field and at headquarters, which is now under way.

As for reassignments and promotions in the service, the minister said, the Eastern Division will now be headed by E. D. Fraser, of Pictou, N.S., who succeeds A. L. Barry, now director of eastern fisheries at departmental headquarters at Ottawa. Mr. Fraser has recently been acting as chief supervisor and for a number of years past he had been district supervisor for the eastern mainland of Nova Scotia.

Regional Supervisors The regional supervisors will be: Nova Scotia, William McLaughlin, who has been for some years district supervisor in Cape Breton; for New Brunswick, L. H. Parks, hitherto a district supervisor in that province; and, for Prince Edward Island, the present district supervisor in the province, J. J. Larabee. The regional offices will be at the respective provincial capitals.

Another new position, assistant chief supervisor for the division, is being filled by the promotion of Frank E. Justason, Black's Harbour, N.B., at present district supervisor for southwestern New Brunswick. Attached to divisional headquarters, now at Halifax, there will also be two senior inspectors, Grade 2—S. J. Homans, who will have the general oversight of fish inspection services throughout the Maritimes, and Forrest Watson, at present Nova Scotia supervisor, at present Nova Scotia. Mr. Watson will be concerned with supervision of technical training.

Regional supervisor McLaughlin will have as his assistant at Nova Scotia headquarters A. J. Fraser, senior inspector, Grade 2, who has been in the department's service for some time as a local inspector in Yarmouth County. George Grant, also qualified as a senior inspector, Grade 2, will be acting assistant at the Fredericton regional office.

Regional headquarters will also have attached to it a senior inspector, Grade 1, who will act as a travelling inspector as required. A. P. Fitzgerald, now an inspector in Guysborough County, has been promoted to the travelling inspectorship for Nova Scotia. The like position in New Brunswick has been filled by the promotion of A. A. Robichaud, hitherto inspector for Restigouche County, and the advancement of Inland by the advancement of Murray Harbour. These and other promotions, the minister added, have been made by the Civil Service Commission, which also selected the new inspectors who are being added to the department's staff.

Italy, a working centre for some Jewish underground groups. JERUSALEM, June 5.—(Reuters)—The Stern Gang, Jewish terrorist organization, issued a statement in Tel Aviv tonight claiming it was responsible for the sending of letter bombs to prominent Britons.

The statement said the "operation" was carried out by the European branch of the "fighters for freedom of Israel." One of the recipients of the envelopes, which contained explosives, was Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery, Chief of the British Imperial General Staff, the statement added, and another was Gen. Sir Evelyn Barker, former general officer commanding British troops in Palestine.
