IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM MINTO. The death occurred on Friday night of William Minto, of Summerside. He deceased was in his usual health, but shortly after retiring he woke up complaining of a smothering sensation. Medical aid was immediately summoned but nothing could be done for him and he expired shortly after the arrival of the doctor. Mr. Minto was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, and when quite a young man emigrated to St. John's, Nfld., where he served his apprenticeship in the Dry Goods business, and from there he came to Summerside about 45 years ago entering the employ of the late R. T. Holman. In 1874 along with Messrs. Neil Sinclair and Wm. Stewart he founded the firm of Sinclair, Minto & Stewart, and on his withdrawal from that business in 1885 he removed to Cardigan, where he carried on a mercantile and shipping business for several years, afterwards returning to Summerside. Mr. Minto was twice married and survived by his wife, one brother in Mabask, Kansas, one son, Charles and three daughters, Mrs. Peter McPherson, Grace Bay, C. E.; Mrs. Robert Wood and Mrs. Alex. Drake, Millview. The late Mr. Minto was a member of the Methodist Church and of the Irons' Order, under the auspices of which the funeral will be held. The funeral services will take place on Tuesday, Aug. 10th, at 2 p.m. from his late residence on Granville St., to the People's Cemetery.

ESTEEMED AMHERST CITIZEN PATRICK CONNELLY, IS DEAD.

It is with deep regret that we today chronicle the death of one of our most aged and esteemed citizens in the person of Patrick Connelly, Beacon street. The deceased was born in Murray Harbor, Prince Edward Island, nearly eight-seven years ago, and came to Amherst with his young bride in the late fifties. He worked for some time with the late Honorable James S. Moorse, and later was in the employ of the late Colonel E. J. Purdy, who had then a contract for driving the mails from Westchester to Amherst. The late Mr. Connelly, had charge of the station at Glenville. After the opening of the I. C. R., he settled in Amherst and during the late years of his life, was one of the faithful employees of Christie Bros. and Company. He was probably the oldest member of St. Charles' first Catholic Church, built in Amherst on Amherst Highland near the Catholic Cemetery, to the lot of land now occupied by the Town Hall and had been associated with the congregation almost since its organization in this town. He was a man that enjoyed the esteem and confidence of all who knew him. His widow, three sons, three daughters survive, and his wife, Mrs. Connelly, who was paying a visit to his home at the time of his father's death in Boston. Also three sisters, Mrs. T. B. Sullivan now at home, but who resides in Lowell, Mass.; Mrs. A. J. Smith, of Vermont, and Mrs. McLebourn Babcock of Boston. The funeral will take place from St. Charles' Church tomorrow morning at nine thirty o'clock. The late Mr. Connelly was apparently in the enjoyment of fairly good health up until a few moments before his death. He was able to be about the house yesterday morning and yesterday afternoon. Suddenly about five o'clock afterwards, and death ensued shortly and he passed from our midst. In his death, we lose one of the old links that bind modern Amherst with its early history.

WOMEN AND THE WAR Rev. Hugh B. Chapman, of the Royal Chapel of the Savoy, London, writes to the London Times, as follows: "Having just returned from France, where I had the honor of spending half an hour alone with General Joffre, the good fortune of paying a visit to Reims, and the inspection of a large workshop for the making of shells, I have brought back one outstanding impression—namely, the spirit which obtains among the women of France, and the use to which it is being put in all directions. The burning patriotism and the willingness to work in every home, from the highest to the lowest, is an inspiration, and the women over here are expelling the Boches from their country. For the exceptions among their manly kind who, on whatever pretext, refuse to offer their lives, they have, and are not ashamed to manifest a withering contempt. Apart from statistics, which is the province of the men, the employment of women in a thousand ways throughout the world, in a thousand ways, is a practical sermon, the neglect of which on our part at the crisis amounts to a betrayal of the cause of civilization. Here in France a wave of female enthusiasm and of consecrated passion which the chief asset in the termination of the war. At a single word of pessimism or murmuring, women are ready not only to take up arms and their courage and beyond all praise, and they constitute a driving force which sends men to the trenches with a song on their lips and a smile on their faces pour la Patrie. They are also prepared, without the smallest self-consciousness or snobbery, to tuck up their sleeves, to economize and to labor without complaint, exhibiting as to the manner born a democratic zeal which rises far beyond politics, and is bound to prove irresistible. All this they are ready to do in the process, they are grateful and save every penny for the conduct of the war. What I desire to impress on the authorities is that the moment has come when men not only should, but must have their chance of service, and that on the part of trade unions and employers there must be an immediate end if victory is to be assured. Neither money nor party should stand in the way, and I am absolutely convinced that the hearts of Englishwomen are panting to express their practical devotion precisely as much as those of their French sisters. No finer message could be sent to our Allies than that of a mighty procession of women on Saturday next, discarding all caste and class, and marching with the banners of their previous conquests, without one dissenting voice, in a defiant claim to take their part in the present struggle for life and honor. You will then find that recruiting goes up by leaps and bounds, that the question of shortage of labor will be enormously solved, and above all, that there will be lit throughout the land a flame which will burn up every form of self-interest, provided that it be not only used but commanded by those to whom are entrusted the destinies of the realm. When General Joffre suggested to me that it must be difficult to feel the war so long as our country was free of invasion, I knew in my heart that it could be brought home mainly by the imagination of women. Later, when at the doors of the Cathedral of Reims, I uncovered before the statue of Jeanne d'Arc, which has up till now escaped every shell as by a miracle, I remarked to a French soldier who had driven me through the lines "Rest assured history will repeat itself, and freedom and religion will owe its salvation to the sex, intended by Heaven to constitute the soul of humanity."

INDIA PRAYING FOR VICTORY TO ALLIES. SIMLA, India, Aug. 7.—(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency, Aug. 7.—) Throughout India interest in the British and Indian communities participating. Numerous patriotic meetings have also been organized by Indian citizens. It is estimated that a million pounds sterling has been subscribed to the British war loan through Bombay and Calcutta.

PROTEST AGAINST RUSSIAN TYRANNY. LONDON, Aug. 6.—German Socialists in Holland have issued a scathing protest against Prussian tyranny, branding the Kaiser, Von Tirpitz, and Bethmann-Hollweg with the marks of eternal shame for plunging Europe into her present miseries. The manifesto, which has been issued by the Committee of the German Humanity League to its associates and to friends in Europe and America, is as follows: —Dear Comrades,—Although by base treachery Ernst Schuster was betrayed at Magdeburg, and met a hero's death, his work has not perished, and we shall not cease to oppose by propaganda the iniquitous policy of the Imperial Government. By false declarations the press is compelled to deceive the Fatherland, and our patriots continue to be slaughtered in the trenches. By golden gifts the members of the Reichstag and publicists have been seduced to betray the people's cause they had sworn to defend. . . . We are convinced that there has been no conspiracy by any Government or nation against Germany, and that on the contrary it is only by the victory of the Allied armies as the Guardians of humanity that we ourselves shall be emancipated from the accursed yoke of Prussian militarism. It is this yoke which crushes us to slavery; that enlightened Democrats in all countries must assist us in breaking before the German States can regain the pathway of peace. We desire outraged Belgium, Luxemburg and France to be restored to tranquility, and the liberation of Poland and Bohemia from the fetters of servitude. To their last hours the Kaiser, Von Tirpitz and Bethmann-Hollweg will carry upon them the brand of shame for the unparalleled ruin they have wrought, and the misery into which they have plunged the world by their barbarism on land and sea. We earnestly appeal to every democratic Saxon, Bavarian, Hapsburgian and Wurtemberger, to join hands with all who realize the unspeakable crime of unprovoked war, and to persevere in demanding the evacuation of Brabant, Flanders and Luxemburg, and the cessation of bloody outrage in Alsace and Lorraine."
