Rogers, City ticket agent that the demand for tourist sleepers on the Canadian Pacific is so heavy that it is necessary to order at least a week or ten days ahead in order to be sure of getting reservation.

The death occurred in East Boston on February seventeenth of Henry Terrel in his seventy-fourth year and after an illness of three years born with Christian fortitude. Mr Terrel came to America from England in 1872 and for thirty years resided in Milton, P. E. I., where he was known and beloved by a large circle of friends. He removed to East Boston with Mrs Terrel on Dec. 13th, last, his son J. J. Terrel, having purchased a cosy home for his reverend parents. Love and tenderness sustained him through his last illness and his family of five, two sons and one daughter in Boston and two daughters in this Province have the sympathy of a large circle of friends. It has been generally conceded that this winter has been equally as bad a season as far as ice in the straits are concerned as has been known in the history of the winter steamers. These conditions are not confined to the straits alone for a Halifax despatch says the following regarding the ice on N. S. coasts: "The ice fields on Nova Scotia coasts are unprecedented in the history of the oldest mariner. The ice extends from near the eastern entrance of Halifax harbor east to Capso. The fields are split up in small cakes, and there is much 'lolly.' The steamer Lady Laurier has returned from Whitehead and Captain Travis reports that through ice all the way going and coming. He says there are thousands of seals on the ice everywhere. The ice extends a considerable distance offshore. A steamer, unnamed from Halifax, is stuck in the ice within forty miles of that place."

A special meeting of the Trade Cross Farmers' Institute was held on Wednesday evening, the 23rd inst. The large hall was filled with an interested and attentive audience. Addresses were given by Miss Dutcher, who has charge of the Domestic Science Department in P. E. College, and by Miss McLeod, who has charge of the same work in the United School. Miss McLeod's object was for the betterment of the home, financially, morally and intellectually, and reminding all that labor was honorable. Miss Dutcher gave a very interesting explanation of the training received in Domestic Science at Guelph and St. Ann's de Bellevue, explaining the different departments of the work, the equipment of the college for said work, the diligence and care that was instilled into the minds of the students and the order that each student was expected to observe in the different branches of the work entrusted to her. Several questions were asked the speaker, to which full explanations were given. After a sincere vote of thanks had been tendered the ladies for the valuable addresses, Rev. Father McGilligan spoke on the educational value of Seed Fairs, reminding all of the opportunities that agriculture was offering to the energetic farmer, of the possibilities within the reach of all, the need of better selection of seeds and grains and the necessity of being more fully educated in agricultural knowledge.
