**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations**

THE sole heir of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must apply in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency.

Lotteries—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.

Lotteries—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 20 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead rights may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years on the land. Cultivate 20 acres of arable land. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

**PRUSSIAN OF THE BALKAN PENINSULA**

Headquarters of the Serbian Army. Nov. 17.—(By Gordon Gordon-Smith)

The advance of the victorious Serbs, in the effort to reclaim their country, and the capture of Monastir, brings up once more the question of what Bulgaria will do, for the retention of Serbian Macedonia with Monastir as the centre, was one of the lures that brought Czar Ferdinand into the war.

When the Sofia government recognizes that "the game is up" it will endeavor to save what it can of the wreckage by offering in exchange for concessions by the allies, to refrain from "fighting to a finish."

Such offers will doubtless impress certain sentimentalists who will point out that by the timely acceptance of these offers the lives of a number of soldiers of the allies will be spared. We will be told that we should hold the hand of friendship to these erring brother and lead them back to the fold.

We will again hear the argument of a brave and honest but ignorant nation being led into evil ways by its wicked German king. It will be pointed out that, all that is required is a slight "rectification of the Balkan frontier," at which the hatchet will be buried and peace and order will again reign in the peninsula.

There could be no more fatal error. Any territorial concessions made to Bulgaria after her cynical ingratitude and he Judas-like breach of her pledged faith would be a betrayal of the interests of every other Balkan people.

Bulgarian history during the last five years is one of treason and perfidy in which the nation at large had its share as much as King Ferdinand and his government. The initial treason of June 28th, 1913, when the Bulgarian army treacherously struck at the Greek and Serbian allies and attempted to stab them in the back—was only the starting point of an era of diplomatic duplicity in which the Sofia government was the willing tool of the central powers.

It is established beyond all doubt that in the summer and autumn of last year M. Radobylow conducted negotiations with the allies, with a view of Bulgaria joining them, for weeks after a hard and fast treaty with Germany and Austria had been signed, sealed and delivered. Under orders of the Wilhelmstrasse he dragged out these negotiations in order to allow of the concentration of the Austro-German armies for the invasion of Serbia to render it impossible for the allies to come to the aid of King Peter's kingdom in time to save it from destruction.
