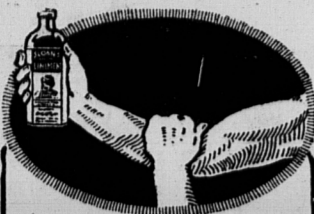

BOSTON-YARMOUTH SERVICE.—The steamer Arammore, formerly of this port, is to commence a regular weekly freight service between Yarmouth and Boston, and left on her first trip on Saturday night. There will be no passenger service. The taking off of the Governor Cobb, which was commended by the United States government, was a serious blow to the Annapolis Valley and the western counties, and led to immediate action by the Dominion Atlantic railway, along whose line originates the bulk of the freight carried on the Yarmouth-Boston route. The strong representations presented by the A. R. management caused the government to place the Arammore in the service.

POTATO PRICES

Since our last comment has been made on this subject through the medium of your worthy journal of late, I beg leave to offer a few remarks. I cannot forego the impulse that urges me to take exception to some remarks that appeared in an editorial of April 1st, charging the farmer with refusing to ship his potatoes at 50 cents last fall. I myself ordered some cars on 23rd of October from the railway, and Mr. Trainor, Train Despatcher, told me that there were over forty orders in ahead of mine. This state of affairs continued till the frost stopped all shipping, so I am fully convinced that it is for want of transportation facilities that so many potatoes were left unshipped.

I will admit that the farmer is to blame for the low price now offered, as he is in general too easily led by silver-tongued professors. In February Montreal quoted \$2.25 for 90-lb. bags; our egg exporters in Charlottetown wrote all the patrons, asking them if they were willing to ship their potatoes through the circle and give them out to the Food Board, and in this way cut off the middleman's profit. As soon as the Food Board secured a promise of the potatoes they negotiated with the foreign markets, and the consequence was that potatoes dropped 40c. per 90 lb. bag. Now, sir, we do not blame the Food Board for what we know that the Board was appointed for the purpose of reducing the cost of living, and if they give the potatoes cheaper to the consumer they are simply discharging their duty. But this is not satisfactory to the farmer, who produces the necessities of life. It is not to be wondered at that more auction sales and farm advertisements are to be seen this year than ever before. You claim that the government is helping the farmer by improved transportation, but I think there is room for improvement. I might bring your attention to the disappointment of many farmers last spring who had lime ordered for their potatoes and turnips, and could not get it carried till it was too late to use it. Not being this time, there were a hundred if not more autos shipped to the transportation, but I think there is months of May and June.
