DiMaggio And Dickey Provide Batting Punch As Yankees Defeat St. Louis Browns 5-

NEW YORK, Aug. 26—Joe DiMaggio and Bill Dickey, two of New York Yankees' bigger cannons, doubled homers today to cash in on Lefty Gomez's all but air-tight pitching and pace the world champions to a 5-1 victory over the cellar dwellers in St. Louis.

For five innings, Jack Knott had a shutout over the Yanks. Then DiMaggio deposited his 37th round tripper of the year into the left field bleachers and Dickey followed with his 26th. After that it was a cinch for Gomez to go on to his third straight win and his 16th of the year.

The defeat for the Browns made a seven-club race of the American League pennant. By losing their 78th game of the year while the Yanks were winning their 78th, the Browns were eliminated from all mathematical possibility of coming through.

Doubles by Luke Appling and Tony Piet gave the White Sox a ninth-inning 4-3 victory over Washington Senators in Chicago.

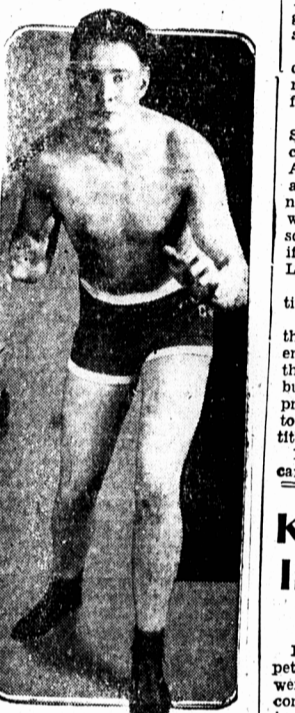

Title Fight Is Postponed Until Monday; Talk Of Schmeling Meeting Winner

NEW YORK, Aug. 26—With a bow of thanks to the weather but mainly on the theory that a four-day postponement can't possibly do the box-office business any harm, Promoter Mike Jacobs today put off the Joe Louis-Tommy Farr heavyweight title match until next Monday night.

Then he turned anew to the possibility of matching the winner with Max Schmeling.

Despite the understanding that Jacobs has no serious intention of giving the German a title shot until next June, when he hopes to put on the long-awaited return Schmeling-Louis fight, talk of an October fight was unexpectedly revived.

Jacobs said he was willing to match the Louis-Farr winner with Schmeling for October 12, at the Madison Square Garden hotel. The big "if" was a condition that the German take the routine challenger's end of 12-1-2 per cent of the net receipts. Schmeling has been holding out for a 30 per cent "cut" for a return bout with Louis, regardless of when or where it is staged.

Joe Jacobs, Schmeling's American manager, said: "Schmeling is ready to fight in October but not for 12 per cent."

The fight's shift to the British Empire developed from an incident at the session of the State Athletic Commission, which was advised of the postponement of tonight's bout while the principals were being weighed and stethoscoped. Schmeling, asked officially if he was willing to meet the Farr-Louis winner, replied:

"I am ready to fight for the title at any time and any place."

Mike Jacobs countered later with the proposition that most observers accepted as another episode in the ballyhoo. With unfinished business still on his hands, the promoter is known to be reluctant to gamble on a third heavyweight title bout this year.

Meantime the breathing spell can do the Farr-Louis gate re-

ceipts no harm. Jacobs seized the excuse of a drizzling morning, plus doubtful weather prospects for tomorrow, to make the first postponement of a heavyweight championship match in New York since pugilism was a fugitive sport. There was another down-pour late this afternoon.

All things considered, the delay may mean an additional \$50,000 for the "gate" but experts will be surprised if it goes much beyond \$250,000.

Farr gained a nine-pound edge over Louis on the scales just before the armistice was called. The British Empire champion weighed 207. Louis scaled 198, only three-quarters of a pound more than he weighed the night he knocked out Jim Braddock for the title two months ago. The rules require they must be weighed and examined all over again next Monday.

Joe went back into his training routine this afternoon at Pompton Lakes, N. J. Tommy planned daily workouts to keep from taking on any excess poundage.

Louis remained a prohibitive favorite in betting circles. Some wagers at 10 to 1 were reported, but there was little enthusiasm for the challenger's chances, even at that fancy price and with the memory of fairly recent upsets in mind.

A gallery of 7,000 applauded the comeback fight of older Evans, winner of the title in 1916 and 1920 and playing in his 28th national amateur.

The Chicago veteran, at 40 nearly twice as old as his rival, struggled with two opponents—Fischer and a case of nerves. Shortly before Evans led off, his wife was struck on the mouth with a golf club swung by a caddy.

Artificial Ice Plant For Local Curlers

At a large and enthusiastic meeting of the different committees appointed by the Charlottetown Curling Club it was decided to begin at once to remodel the building and install an artificial ice plant.

Additional land has been purchased for the purpose of providing spacious and well appointed club rooms on the first floor, with a banquet hall and kitchen above. The basement floor will contain a large locker room, lavatories, and space for the ice plant.

Association Announces Rule Changes

LONDON, Aug. 26—The British Ice Hockey Association has dropped the rule of last season which compelled National League teams to use two English-born players for at least 10 minutes each game.

Object of the rule was to develop native players and develop a strong national team. However, the English teams found it more convenient to scour Canada for English-born players who had learned the game there. Then in February the International Ice Hockey Federation decreed players must be born in and have lived five continuous years in the countries they represented.

Another change this year will be the use of one referee instead of two.
