IRISH LAND BILL LOSING FAVOR.

LONDON, March 28.-(Special)-In the lobbies of Parliament the opinion regarding the Irish land bill is rather less enthusiastic as it is a measure of such complexity that its only chance lies in the doubtful possibility of all parties accepting it in a generous spirit.

Opposition from any quarter would inevitably wreck it.

URGED TO WITHDRAW IT.

It is believed that Irish members will show a carping spirit.

Many Unionist supporters of the Government counsel the bill's withdrawal on the ground of its unpopularity among the British electors, already smarting under the burdens of heavy war taxation.

They were intercepted at Bedford and in a running fight with the officers one was killed and another wounded and captured.

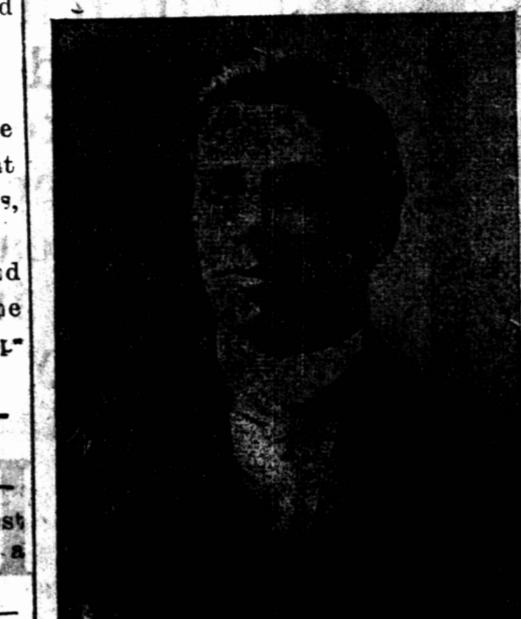
A CONSTRUCTIVE FORCE CONSIDERED

The Address at the Y. M. C. A. by Prof. Robb.

He Spoke Eloquently on Physical Stamina to a Large Audience Composed Principally of Young Men.

FULLY AS INTERESTING AND INSTRUCTIVE AS THE ADDRESSES ON PREVIOUS SUNDAYS WAS THE ONE IN THE Y. M. C. A. YESTERDAY ON PHYSICAL STAMINA BY THE SECRETARY, PROFESSOR A. W. ROBB.

The attendance was very large and much good must be the result. W. S. Louson occupied the chair and in introducing the speaker referred to the excellent work he had done.

Who spoke yesterday on Physical Stamina.

The constructive forces in the making of manhood are now being considered at the Y. M. C. A. Sunday afternoon meetings. The first address on "Physical Stamina" being given by A. W. Robb. The speaker said he was to take a text, it would be "I have written unto you young men because ye are strong for what the world needs to-day, is young men with physical stamina, prepared to bear life's burdens, and do their part in making the world better."

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO A SUBJECT SUCH AS THIS WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN CONSIDERED AS IMPORTANT AS IT IS TO-DAY.

At that time the majority of the people lived in the country and worked with their hands, receiving sufficient exercise to maintain health and strength and supply energy to the brain. Now the cities are crowded, and men work in offices and shops, machines have taken the place of muscles, and the average occupation does not afford the amount of exercise necessary to strength of body and brain. This has been called a strenuous age, as President Hall of Clark University said "this is a world and age of achievement. Men are coming to be measured, more and more, not by what they know, or even by what they feel, important as these are, but by what they can do and actively accomplish in the world."

IN OTHER WORDS A MAN'S VALUE IS MEASURED BY THE AMOUNT OF ENERGY HE CAN PRODUCE AND NOT BY THE OTHER HAND WHEN ONE IS FEELING WELL A SENSE OF VIGOR ENABLES HIM TO WORK AT FULL SPEED ON THE MOST DIFFICULT TASK.

When then is the relation of the physical to perfect health. Huxley tells us that the living body is a mechanism, the proper working of which we call health, the disturbance disease; its stoppage death. That the activity of this mechanism is dependent upon many and complicated conditions, some of which are hopelessly beyond our control, while others are readily accessible, and are capable of being indefinitely modified by our own actions. The proper activity of the muscles than is absolutely essential to perfect health and it is ours to modify the conditions which affect this "wonderful mechanism" and by physical exercise to build up the weak places, until every organ can perform its function, and every muscle do its work.

HEALTH IS A SACRED TRUST, AND THE MAN WHO NEGLECTS HIS HEALTH IS SINKING AGAINST HIMSELF AND AGAINST HIS COUNTRY.

There is a relation between the physical and mental, so the condition of the mind and its ability to work depends to a large extent on the physical nature.

A treatise written lately deals with the relation between body and mind. In proving the relation between muscular activity and mental endurance it pointed out that men whose lives are devoted exclusively to heavy manual labor during long hours, and with little variation, have not the power even if they had the desire, to develop intellectual ability; and on the other hand the man who unconsciously uses his brain without exercising his body will soon be without either mental or physical power. It is a law of the body that

normal activity of any part will stimulate its growth and development to the maximum, while abnormal activity as well as disease will cause its atrophy and degeneration. It is this writer's belief that it is clearly to be seen how important for the best mental development is the most careful development of the physical in man.

An illustration will prove the very close connection between the physical and the mental. Dr. Way of the Maine Reformatory completely altered the conditions and nature of a special class of stupid and immoral delinquents by physical exercise until they came a mental awakening, and their average marking in school for the five months they were under observation had increased 30 per cent over what it was before he began his course, and these gains proved to be permanent. It is a noticeable fact that idiots and criminals are deficient in height, weight, and strength.

There is a very close relation between the physical and the moral. A man with strong, robust frame is likely to have will power enough to overcome temptation. President G. S. Hall said the adult human body is 46 per cent muscle, or nearly one half. That the muscles are the only organs of the will, and are liable to share its strength or its weakness. That there is a sense in which all good conduct and all morality may be defined as right muscle habits and right muscle action. More than this; just in proportion as the muscles grow weak and flabby, the great chasm between knowing and doing the right in which so many men are lost yawns wide and deep, and as they become tense and firm, doing becomes the chief organ of knowing.

Most of those who were present were just starting out in life, and were anxious to get the most out of life. Each had his ideal, and was anxious to attain to his ideal. The ideal might be to be successful in business, and amass a fortune. But though they become as rich as Rockefeller or Carnegie and had not perfect health, life would be in vain, and there would be but little pleasure in the fortune made.

The man who seeks to have influence in society or in the political world will find that those who are adored are not weaklings, but the men of sturdy frame and strong character.

In whatever sphere you may enter, to whatever business or profession you devote yourself, success, true success can never be yours unless you are in health, and as pointed out before, this cannot be attained without due regard for the physical part.

We have a duty to ourselves and to society that we have that staying power, that physical endurance that is within our reach. The man who knowingly injures his body is committing a crime against himself, against society and against the generations to come.

The evil effects of licentiousness, the use of tobacco and strong drink were pointed out showing that they effectually prevent physical stamina.

Is it any wonder that the Young Men's Christian Associations of the country undertake physical work and sought to develop in young men that manhood which would give them the stamina to stand the strain and live pure, true lives.

Systematic exercise keeps all the organs in good condition and helps to oxygenate the blood, builds up strong healthy muscles, strengthens the action of the heart, clears the brain and gives to man physical stamina.

The Bible says "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are." And again, "What if ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit which are God's."

This is the greatest of all, for having a strong body and having physical stamina we should give God the very best. No wonder the Apostle Paul said "I beseech you therefore brethren by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service."

The address closed with an appeal to the young men to yield their lives to God and enter His service.
