HALIFAX, Jan. 18 (CP)—Henry Fraser Munro, Nova Scotia Superintendent of Education for nearly a quarter of a century, died here tonight in hospital. He was 71.

A brilliant scholar and man of ideas, he was responsible for many progressive changes in the education system of the province after his appointment as superintendent in 1926. He was a native of Pictou, N.S.

Dr. Munro's death followed an illness of several months. His career, as an educationalist extended into the international field. He represented Canada at the Imperial Educational Conference in London in 1927 and later led a group of Canadian education directors on a visit to Britain. He was also Canadian representative at the League of Nations education sessions in 1932.

Dr. Munro received his early education at Pictou Academy and matriculated into the second year at Dalhousie University here when he was 17. After teaching at Pictou, he went to Harvard. He received his Master of Arts Degree there and was appointed assistant in international law studies at Harvard.

Later he became instructor and then lecturer in international law at Columbia University in New York.

At the request of the United States State Department he wrote "The B-H in Conference" in 1913. He also wrote many articles on international relations and Canadian history while in the United States.

He came back to Nova Scotia a few years after the First World War. He served as president of the association from 1936 to 1938. During those years he was also president of the association for social education in Canada.

A resolution asking that some other form of taxation in lieu of income taxation be established for primary producers was unanimously passed at a largely attended meeting of farmers held in the Summerside High School auditorium yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the F. I. Federation of Agriculture. The meeting was called for the purpose of discussing the income tax as applied to farmers and two members of the Federation were present. Mr. Allison Proffitt, Pictou, who acted as chairman, and Mr. Lincoln Dewar of New Perth, who performed the duties of secretary.

A number of other resolutions were passed asking for amendments to the Income Tax Act and for changes in the administration of the act. Mr. Proffitt explained that these resolutions could be put into effect while the matter of the trust resolution was being considered by the government.

In opening the meeting Mr. Proffitt explained that the meeting was called to give the farmers a chance to have their say on international relations.

FREDERICTON, Jan. 18 (CP)—New Brunswick's ninth consecutive surplus — \$2,032,418 on ordinary account for the fiscal year ended Oct. 31 last — was revealed in the annual financial statement of the Province released tonight by Hon. J. J. Hayes Doone, provincial secretary-treasurer.

Revenue and expenditures were \$27,071,280 and \$25,038,871, respectively. The revenue was \$3,297,116 more than estimated.

The Dominion subsidy of \$9,964,497 exceeded the estimate by \$55,760. Liquor revenues amounted to \$6,606,291, as compared with \$6,879,631 in the previous year.

Motor vehicle fees, the gasoline tax, tobacco tax and stampage showed increases.

Cost of the provincial general election last summer was \$80,150. Government expenses involved in presentation of New Brunswick's claim for freight rate adjustments amounted to \$50,688.

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 18 (CP)—Resolutions regarding Canadian freight rates were among those adopted today at the annual meeting of the Maritime Federation of Agriculture.

The Federation asked that Federal freight assistance on feed grains shipped to the Maritime Provinces be continued, and that this assistance be adopted as a permanent policy.

A further resolution directed the attention of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture to the burden placed upon the country by increased freight rates. It recommended downward revision of the capital structure and interest rates on the capital of Canadian railways and endorsed the royal commission inquiry of Canadian transportation.

The Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture is likely to rejoin the Maritime Federation. The Island group withdrew soon after the Maritime group was set up in 1935.

LONDON, Jan. 18 (CP)—A peaceful settlement of the dispute over Palestine between Israel and her Arab neighbors is "the main object" of the British Government, Foreign Secretary Bevin said today.

Britain has "no obligations or intention to engage in any offensive or aggressive action" in the Middle East fighting over the Holy Land, he said in the House of Commons.

Government and Opposition leaders, speaking in a packed house, agreed that discussions of Palestine and Middle East issues should be left to next week. Bevin said a full-scale debate now might endanger the success of the Jewish-Egyptian peace talks on the Island of Rhodes.

A small liberal group of 11 members pressed for immediate discussion but lost their argument. As parliament met for the first time since five R.A.F. planes were shot down by Israeli forces near Palestine-Egyptian border.

Opposition leader Winston Churchill asked for a statement of "policy or facts" from the government.

Bevin said delicate negotiations were under way at Rhodes between Jewish and Egyptian representatives and "there also are discussions going on with other contestants."

"We have been using all our influence in conjunction with the United States in the hope of arriving at a complete armistice between Jews and Arabs."

"The reports we are receiving indicate that good progress is being made and we are particularly eager to contribute to the success of these talks by every possible means."

Bevin announced Britain in the meantime is preparing to permit the departure from Cyprus of Jewish immigrants of military age who have been detained there.

LONDON, Jan. 18 (AP)—The Labor Party has nominated a war veteran studying at Oxford University to oppose Winston Churchill in the constituency of Woodford, Essex — a suburb of Northeast London.

Edmund Selous, 34, was a member of the 11th Airborne Division during the war. He was wounded in the D-Day landings and spent time in a prisoner-of-war camp.

Washington, Jan. 18 (AP)—Dean Acheson today was confirmed by the Senate as Secretary of State to succeed General George C. Marshall. The vote was 83 to 6.

OTTAWA, Jan. 18 (CP)—The ban on imports of United States pork and pork products has been restored because of a conflict with the United Kingdom bacon contract, it was learned today.

The prohibition had been lifted in a list of other temporary relaxations announced in mid-December and scheduled to take effect on Jan. 1. However, the relaxation could go into force only if the cabinet passed an order-in-council reimposing the ban as far as pork is concerned.
