## VOYAGE TO SOUTH AFRICA

(Continued From Third Page.) see us getting round the deck running into everybody and everything—three chairs rolled over board from right along-side of me this morning, and the passengers slid along the decks on hands and knees and many comical shots have been taken.

We expect to be in Cape Town tomorrow, although we may not disembark until Monday and then what is ahead of us? It is as uncertain as when I left home, but I shall let you know on arrival.

I must think of getting packed up now. Our cabin has simply gone wild with the rolling of the ship. Grace is scooting across the room on top of a trunk, my wash basin is smashed, and my gr. p. has gone under my berth to keep company with boots, tooth brushes, towels and clothes of all descriptions.

June 2nd.—We anchored in Table Bay last night and have the city in front of us. Table Mountain and the surrounding peaks are enfolded in clouds. How strange it all seems. The climax of pitching was reached Saturday night. We got up and dressed as sleep was out of the question and we did not wish to be knocked to pieces in our berths. I did not know it was so serious, but the ship rolled to an angle of 30° which is considered very dangerous. The officers tried to make light of it, but it was very serious. Almost all the dishes have been smashed to shreds, the piano is lashed together as it is completely ruined, everything is more or less wrecked, among them being our trunks. It was exciting, and although Grace and I enjoyed it, we dare not express our feelings, as many were wild with fright. We are rested now, but we were a very weary crowd yesterday. We expect to land about luncheon time today and then—I hope we shall go to Pretoria.

There was quite a sensation on board when word came that peace had been proclaimed! So the war is over. The officer has come on board and we have presented our permits, so I must get things in order.

Noon.—We are just about to disembark and have received word of our locality. Capt. Beer has mentioned me for Bloemfontein, so Grace, Miss DeWolf, Miss Lee and I shall take the train to-morrow for Bloemfontein. Mrs. Beer has invited me to stay with her to-night at Rondebosch. I am delighted and so I ought to be for it is so nice to have these kind friends to look after me. Now you know my address.
