THE LETTER CARRIER SYSTEM.

For many years past The Guardian has advocated the carrier system for the delivery of letters and papers. Once we took a ballot on the question which resulted unanimously in favor of the proposed improvement. It is difficult to say anything new on this subject after so much has been said, and perhaps we cannot do better than to adopt Captain Bobadil's method of defeating an army, which was to "kill them all by computation." And to get a basis for our figures let us follow the baker's man in his wagon as he goes his rounds.

We shall perhaps fear that he calls upon 200 families in a day at their homes, averaging, say a quarter of a mile distant from the bakery, and that he does this 313 times in a year, travelling some five miles in his daily round. Five miles a day for 313 days makes a total of 1565 miles. Now let us suppose that those 200 families declined to have the baker's man visit them and preferred each of them to send a member of the family once a day for the one or more loaves of bread they needed. Each family messenger would on an average travel half a mile daily going and returning and the 200 persons would walk 100 miles and in the 313 working days would travel 31,300 miles.

Here then we have a fair illustration of the saving of the carrier system. If the baker's man serving 200 families and himself travelling 1565 miles, saves the aforesaid families 31,300 miles of travel in a year, how many miles would be saved by, say, four letter carriers serving the 2,400 families of Charlottetown with their letters at their own doors in a like period? Let us say the saving would be 100,000 miles—a moderate estimate—and in ten years a million miles! Now The Guardian has been advocating the carrier system since 1896, and the carrier system was offered to our people that long ago, we believe.

A million miles of needless travel! Of course it was good for the boot and shoe trade. It is a good pair of boots that will carry the wearer on foot 500 miles. Two hundred pairs of boots worn out yearly going to and from the post office, costing \$2 per pair, or \$400; in ten years \$4,000. Time, too, is worth something. Say half an hour a day for one member of each of 1,000 families—omitting 1,400 families who only send to the post office "occasionally"—and reckoning at 20 cents an hour. We have then 1,000 families losing time worth 10 cents daily for 313 days. This makes a formidable bill, \$100 a day or \$31,300 a year, or \$313,000 in ten years.

Let us sum up our losses, and therefrom estimate what our gains would be if we had the carrier system. One hundred thousand miles of needless tramping, two hundred pairs of boots worn out and \$31,300 for lost time in a single year. And all this time the baker, the grocer, the butcher and the milkman have been giving us practical demonstrations of the benefit of the few serving the many. We are behind other cities of the old and new world in this matter, and our visitors from abroad take note of our backwardness. In most other respects we are more modern. We want the carrier system for its convenience, its saving of labor, time and money. We want it in order to be up-to-date.

An Ottawa despatch to the Toronto Globe says that the increased subsidy to be received by Prince Edward Island will be \$65,347. Somebody should make the Globe wiser in this matter.

For ourselves we adopt the language of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and express our surprise that "this was not done long ago." But better late never. We have waited sixteen years since Sir Wilfrid was "surprised" in that way, and if he will not keep us waiting any longer he will still earn our thanks.

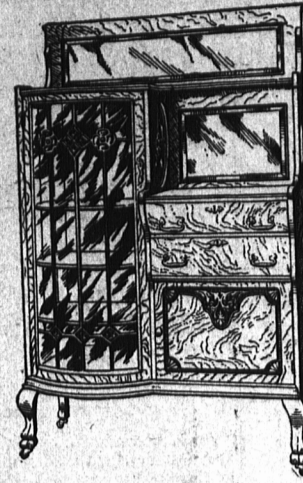

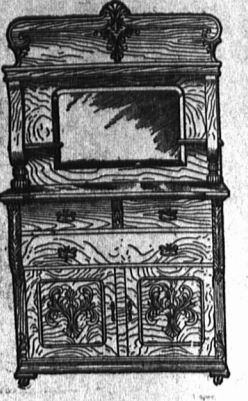

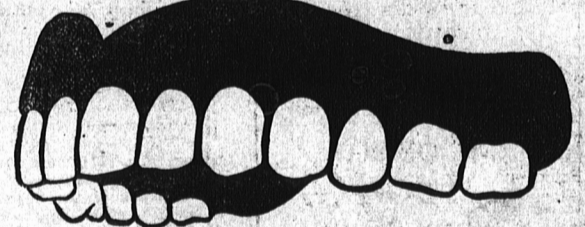
