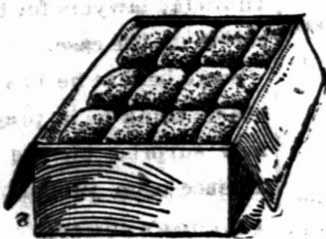

**THE COMING CUP RACE.**

No sporting trophy perhaps in all the ages has challenged a keener competition or a wider interest than the America Cup, a yachting prize which our American friends have so long held without a break, and which has been so eagerly contested for by British yachtsmen. In the coming autumn that gallant sportsman, Sir Thomas Lipton will again, barring accidents, appear in the lists and endeavor to capture the coveted cup. By repeated references and illustrations our readers have been made familiar with Sir Thomas and his successive Shamrocks but are less acquainted with the new craft by which he will be this year opposed. For the great cup race of 1903 will be contested by the challenger Shamrock III and the defender, named the Reliance, put forward by the New York Yacht Club, possessors of the cup.

So little has heretofore appeared in these columns concerning the defender, and so much, comparatively about the challenger, her launching, her trial races with the older Shamrock, and her recent unfortunate accident, that a few words about the Reliance will now be in order. Sir Thomas Lipton has sanguine expectations for the challenger, designed by Watson, and our American cousins are not less confident of the performances of the Reliance, designed, as was the previous defender, by Herreshoff. The most famous American designers, builders and yachtsmen have examined the new craft and all express unqualified admiration. Burgess, a famous yacht builder says, "Reliance is a beauty, very flat, and immensely fuller than Constitution or Columbia. It has a beautiful bow and stern. I think it will prove the fastest cup-racer ever built." Spears, a well known yacht expert, believes that "it will be a flyer in broad-reach and down wind, blow high, or blow low," that in windward work in a smooth sea "it should exceed the older boats," and that in a stiff breeze and a lumpy sea "it will slide over the waves as a toboggan, slides down a well ice'd hill."

Omitting technicalities, the Reliance is described as "longer, flatter and broader than any of Herreshoff's previous boats, and yet by reason of the heavier weight of lead in her fin is able to carry a spread of canvas bigger than any thing known before"—15,500 square feet. We are told that it is nearer the American skimming dish than any cup boat ever built. Shamrock III has a narrower beam, and a hull twice as deep as the Reliance. The New York Evening Post's expert puts the case thus: "Reliance is a skimming dish built to sail on and over the water, while Shamrock III is more nearly a cruising type and built to sail in and through the water." It is evident that the challenger and defender are of two different types, that the best that Britain and America can for the time produce will meet in the coming race with equal confidence on both sides. Sir Thomas Lipton is so true and gallant a sportsman, that for his own sake as well as on national grounds British and Canadian sympathy must run with him very generally, but all must see that the issue of the contest is at best doubtful.

**A SINGULAR JUDGMENT.**

Judge Curran of Montreal the other day handed down a judgment which at this distance reads strangely. A part of this judgment, and the only portion to which we shall now refer dealt with a charge against members of the Montreal Police force for defrauding the city. The policemen in question, having instructions from the chief to be measured for new uniforms, procured instead new suits of civilian's clothes in addition to having their old uniforms somewhat cleaned or repaired. They did not get new uniforms at all, but "stood in" with the tailoring firm that had the contract to deceive the authorities in the manner mentioned and continued to wear their old uniforms while the city paid the big bill for the new ones. They were charged with fraud and we believe found guilty by the lower court.

Judge Curran exonerated the police officers from the charge of fraud in taking civilian's clothes instead of official uniforms, on the ground that long usage had sanctioned the practice. The usage, if such it had been, was thought to be so decidedly wrong that no small measure of indignant press comment and criticism greeted the disclosure of the facts. So strong was the feeling that what had been done was dishonest and disreputable that even the not very scrupulous City Council of Montreal promptly passed a resolution forbidding the practice for the future. But because it was shown that the thing had been done before, and was apparently winked at by some one in authority over the men, they were exonerated. We are of opinion that Judge Curran's lenient judgment will hardly be considered as an authoritative precedent hereafter outside of the Province of Quebec.

**MIGHT BE IMPROVED.**

The Guardian's attention has been directed to matters pertaining to the better enforcement of the Canada Temperance Act in King's County in which it is thought an improvement might be and ought to be effected. At present as we are informed the Stipendiary in Charlottetown, and the Stipendiary then proceeds to Georgetown to issue the papers. His arrival is at once noted by the parties complained of, who suspect that a complaint has been made, and by the time the papers are ready the places of illegal sale are closed up and it is made difficult and frequently impossible without long delay to serve the papers. It is suggested that to avoid this publicity which defeats the ends of justice, a local magistrate might take the information and issue the summons, the case to be afterwards heard by the Stipendiary.

It is also suggested with apparently good reason that when witnesses are subpoenaed and refuse to come to court a warrant should be at once issued. This would afford a wholesome lesson to a number who now persistently refuse to respond to the milder form of notice. A correspondent also points out the desirability of a lawyer being employed to conduct the more difficult cases. At present the Prosecutor has no authority to employ counsel. There are many ways in which the Government, if heartily disposed to do so could greatly assist the work of carrying out the Temperance Act, and we trust they will give the matter their serious attention. The great majority of right-thinking people desire to have the law carried into effect, and we are not without hope that the Government, which has given us so good a law in Charlottetown, may respond to the popular demand in regard to the Scott Act. There appears to be a temperance awakening in Kings which we are glad to record and we hope and trust that the authorities will take cognizance of it also.
