-SCHOOL MEETING.—An important meeting of teachers and rate-payers of Edmond Bay was held in St. Philip's Hall on Monday evening January 29th. The attendance of rate-payers was not large as there had been a misunderstanding. The teachers however were nearly all in attendance and the meeting though small was interesting. Rev. Father Boudreau who was present addressed the meeting and as usual his remarks were full of wise counsel and encouragement to the teachers. He entertained the earnest hope that something would be done to increase the remuneration to teachers. Their vocation was a noble one and their responsibility was great. While not much time could be given to the teaching of Agriculture in school, yet a teacher could teach his pupils to take delight in observing the work of nature. A lively discussion then ensued re the Teachers' Union. Those who were in favour of the Union set forth their arguments forcibly and in short it was this, that the question of teachers' salary had been discussed, and threshed out over and over again, for years and years back, and everywhere, on the platform, in Parliament, and other places. What sincerity animated such discussions must not be measured by the increase in the salaries obtained. The true, though unpleasant facts of the situation, are that in spite of all suggestions for a remedy the teachers lot is yet not an enviable one with the result that the condition of our schools is not what it should be. Therefore at the present crisis no other remedy but a strike by a universal union among teachers. Those who were opposed, emphasised that the teacher certainly was entitled to a great increase in salary, but their proposed union would not bring about the desired results. A Teachers' Union was certainly a good thing but while a much higher wage was needed by them, plans should be laid out so that the increase burden of taxation among rate-payers should be divided equitably according to their means. An unanimous vote of thanks was taken to be tendered through the press to Rev. Dr. Gauthier and other speakers, who had at the recent meeting of Farmers' Institute so forcibly spoken in behalf of teachers and schools. Mr. Aubin Gallant, Principal of Mt. Carmel School and assistant Miss Corinae Arsenault were present.—M.
