Distribution Of Red Cross Cigarettes

In yesterday's editorial column it was suggested that the Red Cross might "fill the breach" by providing cigarettes at their reduced price for the visiting veterans in hospital done by the Canadian Legion. A Red Cross official has informed The Guardian that this would be impossible as these cigarettes are stamped with the Red Cross insignia and therefore would not be acceptable for distribution by any other organization. Furthermore, there is no breach in the services being rendered by the Canadian Red Cross for veterans in hospital. Regularly every Monday night members of the Red Cross Corps — that splendid group of young women volunteers — visit the veterans in hospital and bring them cigarettes, new magazines, pocket novels or games all of which are supplied by the Red Cross, as well as fruit provided by the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion. There are on an average of 75 veterans in hospital each week — last year some 3,261 were visited. In addition, the Red Cross Arts & Crafts Supervisor spending her full time instructing veteran patients in handicrafts she also does many little messages and shopping for them. Further entertainment is provided through a weekly film show in the three Charlottetown Hospitals and at Falconwood. These film shows are financed jointly by the Red Cross and D. V. A. Members of the Red Cross Corps also staff a lending library at P. E. I. Hospital one night each week, where they distribute books supplied by the I. O. D. E.

Poppy Day Appeal By Lieut. Governor

In an address last evening on the opening of the Poppy Day Appeal, Lieut. Governor Bernard said in part: "Wearing the little red emblem symbolizes our remembrance and our appreciation of the sacrifices made, while the amounts donated will assist in lightening the burdens of those who are still undergoing suffering and hardship because of the war. The amounts constitute the disabled Veterans and the families of the disabled and the dead."

"Our duty is plain at this time. By purchasing Poppies which are available this week we will not only be showing that we are full of grateful remembrance to Veterans but our contributions will materially aid in carrying on the splendid work being done for so many. The benefits which accrue from the sale of Poppies are a year reach out in many directions and bring assistance and hope into lives blighted by war, while many Veterans are given employment which aids them financially as well as mentally. The scope covered by the money donated for Poppies is very great and we have little idea what benefits are received or shared from such sales. We do know however, that unless we buy and wear the emblem which represents so much to Legionnaires that the day set apart for this purpose will not be a successful one."

The chairman also tendered thanks of the meeting to Mr. W. E. Scantlebury for his chart record of the returns, and to Mr. H. W. Dick and fellow workers who compiled and tabulated the returns. Regret was expressed by Mr. DeBlas for the absence of Major and Mrs. MacLean. Tribute was paid their work here with the Salvation Army the past three years. In reply Major MacLean thanked the workers for their co-operation and splendid results achieved. the brief were "ridiculously low" and should be revised upwards, but that in any case, producers "would have to receive \$1.06 per lb. of butterfat to come near the cost of production."

In presenting the brief, Mr. MacDonald reported lack of interest in Summerside towards any change in the price of milk. He pointed out that the figure \$124 depreciation on a cow was "ridiculous," when losses are considered. Discussion on the evils of "surplus milk" brought forth many suggestions. Mr. Andrew MacRae pointed out that this was handled in some quarters by a central receiving station and Mr. Guy Rodd called for the formation of a committee "to investigate the forming of a co-operative to handle surplus milk."

Declares Tarawa Campaign Mistake

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 — (AP) — Gen. Holland M. (Howlin) Mad Smith of the United States Marine Corps said today the Tarawa campaign in the South Pacific in 1943 was a mistake and a "terrible waste of life and effort."

He said Tarawa had little strategic value and should have been bypassed to "wither on the vine" as were Rabaul in the South Pacific and Truk in the Central Pacific.

"From the very beginning," he added, "the decision of the joint chiefs of staff to seize Tarawa was a mistake, and from their initial mistake grew the terrible drama of errors—errors of omission rather than commission, resulting in these needless casualties."

Fewer Potatoes Moving By Rail

Slightly more than six hundred cars of potatoes have been handled by the Island Division, Canadian National Railway, this season as compared to 1,187 cars for the corresponding period last year. The 50 per cent decrease is partly attributable to the lateness of the digging season this year and partly to the scarcity of refrigerator cars. Turnip shipments, however, show a slight increase over those of last year. To date this season, 344 cars have been shipped as compared to 325 cars for the same period last year.

"Makin should have been cleaned up in one day, but fighting dragged out three days and claimed me to this insignificant skirmish."

"When I returned to Pearl Harbor, I reported to Admiral Nimitz that had Ralph Smith been a Marine I would have relieved him of command on the spot. His conduct of the operations did not measure up to my expectations in the slightest degree."
