you are in Charlottetown and I in Souris that my statements regarding the affairs of the town may be considered more reliable than yours, and it is my opinion that the temperance people of this town are perfectly satisfied with the performance of Prosecutor Jos. Meade and Stipendiary A. F. McQuaid, during the short time of two months they have been in office and are willing to wait before offering any criticism, and it will take more proof than your insinuations that they have been inactive, to create any other feeling.

Prosecutor Meade has obtained four convictions within the bounds of Souris since he was sworn in and others without the bounds, and has acted on his commitment papers very promptly.

Stipendiary McQuaid has up to the present received no records from the previous Magistrate with whom you choose to compare him and with whom I think he is willing to stand comparison, and if you or any legal court records in his possession or in existence a new prosecutor can swear out, or a new Magistrate can issue second or third offence papers, than I will acknowledge that you know something concerning the matters you are writing on but otherwise I will remain of the opinion that it would be better for you to specialize on some particular subject and not jump from advising the farmers how to farm and the size of the farms they should farm, to admonishing our prosecutors and Magistrates.

Permit me to say also that one of your articles on assuming the editor's chair entreated some leniency from your readers until such time as you should have grasped your new situation; yet you begin by knocking a newly incorporated town; a new prosecutor and a new Magistrate unfeelingly.

I have no brief from the prosecutor or magistrate, but I have a very unanimous one from the citizens of Souris, and when any complaints, true or untrue, relating to Souris, get misguided to your office kindly ascertain their correctness before holding this town before the public in such an unfavorable light, and publish all the facts without attaching any insinuations. We are not banded together to protect the rum-sellers. We are satisfied with the prosecutor to date, and as far as I know there is no understanding that those who have been fined are not to be molested. And we have not found the necessity of a "Guardian."

And with this before you I leave the matter to you to make what reparation you consider called for to the Town of Souris.
