Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any issue over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may purchase a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after entering homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be stub-titled for control under certain conditions. W. W. LUNY, C. M. After the routine business was disposed of the following report was submitted by the manager, Mr. K. Ferguson: Season 1916. Total dozen collected 42,090.8; Extras 38,612.9; No. 1's 3,421.7; Bad 56.4. Total 42,090.8. Value \$10,547.66. Messrs Sencabaugh, Brooks, Gillings, and others spoke in eulogistic terms of the work done by Mr. Ferguson, who was presented with a donation from the Circle in recognition of his efficiency as a manager. RED CROSS APPEAL

Charlottetown, P. E. I. December 20th, 1916. In accordance with a proclamation by His Honour, the Lieutenant-Governor, a public meeting was held at Charlottetown, on the 16th inst., to take action in response to an appeal made to the Empire at large, by Lord Lansdowne, President of the British Red Cross, for a collection in aid of the Society's funds similar to that taken up last year on Trafalgar Day.

This appeal has the support of the Dominion Government and the Canadian Red Cross, and in order that all classes may be given an opportunity to respond, and make up a creditable return, a committee was appointed to further the success of a general meeting of ladies and gentlemen to provide ways and means for collecting for this purpose throughout the province.

The proposed meeting will be held on Friday, Dec. 28th at 8 p. m., in the Provincial Building at Charlottetown. Clergymen residing in Charlottetown are requested to send notice of the meeting and its purpose to the clergy of their particular denominations who reside in the towns or rural sections, and to request their attendance, or that of substitutes, so that every section of the Province may be represented. The urgency of the need of assistance to the Red Cross, which under the sorrowful fortunes of war is overtaxed in its widespread sphere of usefulness, calls for present energetic and united action on the part of all classes and creeds throughout the British Empire. WOUNDED SOLDIERS ARE WELL CARED FOR

Mrs. George R. Dixon, Fortune Bridge, has received the following letter from her son, Pte. Joseph M. Dixon, No. 177348, Canadian Grenadier Guards, France: Nov. 25, 1916. My dear mother— Just a line to let you know I got wounded, but not a serious one. I got wounded on the 18th at six o'clock in the morning. It was in a charge but we took the trench and a lot of German prisoners. The Lord has been very merciful to me since I came out here. We took a trench about three weeks ago and I never got a scratch, so I ought to thank the Lord. Now, mother, don't worry about me for I am now in a good bed and lots to eat and drink. I am at the base yet, but think I will be sent to England soon; so don't worry. I hope that you are all well here now. We are having lots of rain here now. Well, mother, I will write when I get to England; so I will close for now. With lots of love to all, I remain, your loving son, JOE.

The Canadian Red Cross Society of London, has also forwarded a letter to Mrs. Dixon as follows:— London, S. W., Dec. 4, 1916.

Dear madam— I beg to inform you that Pte. J. M. Dixon, No. 177,348, 87th Grenadier Guards, who is now at the Military Hospital, Colchester, has been seen by our visitor, who reports his having received a gun shot wound in his side. He complains of slight pain where the bullet had passed through, but otherwise is well. You may rest assured that we shall do anything we can to add to his happiness, visiting him regularly and supplying him with special comforts. We hope to send you good news of him next week. EXPECT INCREASE IN POTATO PRICE

(Boston Globe, Friday.) Instead of getting 150,000 bushels of potatoes from the Provinces during the next few days, as was suggested by one of yesterday morning's papers, this market will not get much more than one-tenth of that quantity, according to William H. Ames, of the John Groves Company, which has been one of the leading concerns in the matter of bringing potatoes here from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island this season.

"We had shipments aggregating about 10,000 bushels on Wednesday and there will probably be a few more shipments during the next few days that will probably bring the total arrivals to 15,000 bushels," said Mr. Ames, "but there is not much chance of getting many more because for one thing it is hard to secure boats and the potatoes are costing so much down in the Provinces that there is very little margin of profit for the use at the price that they command here."

Mr. Ames added that 10,000 bushels was less than one-half day's local requirements, and that even if it were possible to bring 150,000 bushels here they would represent less than a week's supply, for the current local demand calls for about 40 cars of 700 bushels each, or 28,000 bushels a day. The effect of the recent arrivals on market prices may be gauged from the fact that while the Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick potatoes have sold at \$3.25 to \$3.35 per two-bushel bag no charge being made for the bag Maine tubers have been bringing \$3.50 to \$3.60 a bag, which represents a rise in the latter of 25 to 30c. a bag since last week.

BRITISH SHIPBUILDING

Over the industrial activities that are closely related to the war, England, like the other belligerent countries has drawn the veil of censorship. Recently, however, for one interesting moment the veil has been lifted. An intelligent and trustworthy American journalist has been permitted to inspect the shipbuilding yards on the Clyde. His account of what he saw makes truly startling reading.

A member of a leading shipbuilding firm told him that the production of the Clyde now is slightly greater than the highest production of all the yards in the German Empire before the war. And the Clyde, although the largest ship manufacturing in Great Britain, is not the only one. In 1914 it produced about one quarter of the total tonnage built in the country. It is probable, therefore, that today the British are putting out nearly if not quite, four times as many ships as the Germans can build.

is the use of surpassing the enemy's possible maximum to such an overwhelming degree? After a reasonable margin of safety has once been reached, could not the labor and resources be more profitably employed in other ways?

Replying to that question, British naval experts told the American journalist that the intention is to produce a navy of such overwhelming superiority as to convince the German people at the end of the war that naval rivalry with Great Britain is out of the question. If the Germans were once convinced of this, then and then only would relaxation of naval building be possible and the way prepared for a general reduction of armament.

The journalist declares that the new west ships are building on the Clyde completely outclass the ships that Congress has authorized. "The ships that England tells the world about are already out of date," said the foremost naval expert in England. And it is upon the ships that England has told the world about that it has forced its naval standards.
