RESULT OF BALLOT.—The ballots received in Dundas Presbyterian congregation for and against Union revealed the fact that 333 votes in all were collected, only 3 or 4 of the 150 families in the field failed to deposit ballots. There were 130 communicants and 140 adherents for, and 33 communicants and 30 adherents against Union. 7 members of session for and 2 against the proposed Union. About four fifths of the families, communicants and adherents, then declared in favour of closer relationship to the Methodist and Congregationalist denominations. SUCCESSFUL SUPPER AND ENTERTAINMENT.—The fowl supper and entertainment held Thursday evening in the public hall at Crapaud, under the auspices of the ladies of St. John's Church, Crapaud, was a decided success, socially and financially well. VISIT COLD STORAGE PLANT.—The city teachers' class which has been meeting twice a week during the term studying Nature Study and rural science methods and topics, paid a visit Thursday afternoon to the Davis & Fraser plant. Under the able direction of Manager McAdam all the different departments were examined and explained. Much interest was taken by the teachers in the processes of meat inspection, curing, storing and preparing for market and surprise was expressed at the magnitude of the plant and the large amount of island animal products that are prepared for export or for the local market by this firm. At the present time about 70 hands are employed and for some time have worked overtime. About a quarter of a million dollars worth of meat is represented in the stock on this is constantly going out and being replenished, the close connection of this industry with the live stock industry of the island can be readily appreciated. Amongst other things the teachers were shown the two refrigeration processes employed for chilling or freezing, the ammonia gas condensers, the egg candling and storing rooms, the freezing rooms, the English bacon curing, smoking and packing, the sausage department, the fertilizer-making process, the recovery of animal fats by heating in tanks and pressing in the hydraulic press. One of the most interesting things was a demonstration on cutting up a bacon hog into the different parts required for the most advantageous marketing; the skill of the men in this work was much admired. Dr. Bannfield accompanied the class and explained the inspection requirements under the Dominion Meat Inspection Act for the production of certified meat products.

MOUNT STEWART.—The opening of the smelt fishing season was marked here by a severe rain storm. The fish are reported to be scarce, and good catches may be expected to be rare.—The former principal of Mount Stewart school, Mr. Newsom, having been enlisted for active service, Mr. Clay of Dundas has been engaged to fill the vacancy.—The Bazaar held here recently by the ladies in aid of the Red Cross was quite a successful affair both socially and financially.
