WANT SHORTER HOURS AND INCREASED SALARIES

WINNIPEG, July 15.—Shorter hours, increased salaries and a half for overtime, were resolved upon as the coming year's objective by the Canadian Postmasters Association at their concluding session of their convention here. Other resolutions adopted included a request for participation in the Civil Service Postmaster's Association, a demand that special consideration be given the pay basis of postal officials at customs ports and to officials on night staffs transferring mails from trains. At the filiation of the association with the railway postal clerks, city postal clerks and letter-carriers' association was recommended. All of the officers were re-elected.

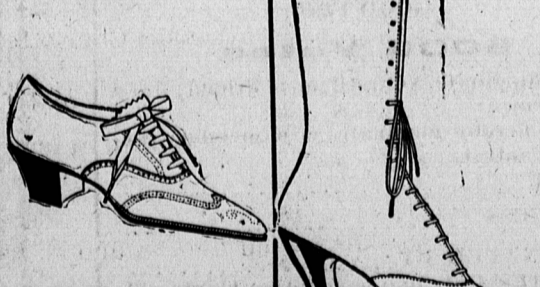
