INVITATION NOT A ROYAL COMMAND

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Lady Diana Doublougher regrets that she was unavoidably prevented from obeying their Majesties' Command to attend the garden party at Buckingham Palace.

Announcements like this in the social columns of the London Press published for a fee of three guineas per insertion—were of frequent occurrence lately after the interesting function at the Palace last month. They have caused amusement rather than respectful interest, among those who have real knowledge of procedure in high social matters.

In the first place an invitation to a Garden Party at Buckingham Palace is not in the nature of a "Command". The invitations are issued on the joint behalf of the King and Queen, prerogative of issuing "commands" is "commanded" to issue the invitations (and indicates so on the card of invitation) And it is not deemed necessary for anyone to offer a public apology to the King or Queen.

To Film Great Cariboo Trek
THE PAS, Man., Aug. 21.—In search of "real color" for a special cinema picture, a party representing the Natural History Museum of New York will go north from here shortly to the Barren Lands about 500 miles north of Reindeer Lake.

It is their intention of filming the immense caribou herds on their northern migration in the latter part of October and to stage a caribou hunt with Indians employing native bow and arrow.

A number of experienced prospectors and trappers familiar with the North Country have been engaged to accompany the party throughout the journey.

Spine Mended By Ox Bone
(By British United Press)
LONDON August. 21.—A miraculous cure by means of bone grafting has been effected by a young surgeon at Dudley-road Hospital, Birmingham.

A 30-year-old farm labourer from Worcestershire, who had been paralysed and bedridden for two years with tubercular spine, was admitted to the hospital several months ago. The surgeon determined to graft a piece of ox bone, and this having been produced, a carpenter roughed it into the shape required by the surgeon, who had supplied him with a cardboard design.

After further shaping by the surgeon himself, a 10-inch piece of bone was placed in cavity in the patient's spine, and a connection between the vertebrae established.

The patient's power of movement was gradually restored, and he is now following his own occupation, walking 19 miles a day to and from his employment. It is believed that that cure will be permanent.

Similar operations have been made since on others in a less serious state.

Reindeers To Race

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., Aug. 21.—That proportion of the public in western Canada which is thrilled by racing, whether horse, motor, aeroplane or dog, will be provided with a new diversion this winter according to H. J. Opsahl, of Vancouver, B. C. who proposes to stage a series of reindeer races in the principal cities in the west.

Mr. Opsahl, who owns 20 reindeer, states that he has arranged for this innovation in the field of racing to show the public "what speed means." He proposes to bring six Eskimos from their northern habitat to drive and care for the animals.

Present plans provide for races in Calgary, Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert, and Winnipeg. There is a possibility that Mr. Opsahl will take his "stable" across the international border and stage races in some of the United States cities where weather conditions permit.

Great Victory for Premier Venizelos

ATHENS, Greece, Aug. 21.—The sweeping nature of the Liberal party's victory in yesterday's elections for parliament was revealed in late returns tonight which indicated that the followers of Premier Venizelos would hold between 220 and 230 of the 280 seats in the chamber of deputies.

The extent of the Royalist collapse was shown by the voting in Athens, where 19,066 votes were cast for Liberal candidates and only 9,362 for Royalists.

With the exception of Panyoti Tsaldaris, all Royalist leaders were rejected.
