MEDAL FOR HERO OF TITANIC DISASTER.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Captain Arthur H. Rostron, hero of the Titanic disaster, will be honored here on March 1, when President Taft, in the presence of both houses of Congress, the full diplomatic corps, the heads of the army and navy, together with the social elite of the capital, will pin upon Captain Rostron the gold medal awarded him by Congress.

This medal has been awarded less than a dozen times by the Congress, and is the highest recognition for heroic service the nation can bestow. At the time the Titanic was sending out her distress calls there were other vessels nearer the doomed ship than the Carpathia, which Captain Rostron commanded, but he gave his vessel to the scene of the catastrophe with his eyes through fields of ice.

TO MAKE TRAIN COMPANIES REASONABLE

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—First reading was given to the House of Commons Friday evening to a bill introduced by the Hon. Mr. Pelletier, entitled "An Act respecting the conveyance of letter carriers on electric railways."

The purpose of the bill, the Postmaster-General explained, was to compel street railways to transport letter carriers and other post office officials at reasonable rates, as the charges of certain companies had tended to become excessive. It will be recalled that certain difficulties arose recently between the Postmaster-General and the street railway companies of Montreal and Toronto on the question of the conveyance of carriers.

MILLER GETTING TIRED OF PRISON

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—Parliament's prisoner, Miller, is still in the county jail and his lawyers are engaged in figuring out what the next move should be. It is understood that Miller is tired of bolts and bars. He wants action. There are two places to go. One is to the Supreme Court for habeas corpus and the other to the bar of parliament with the information which Parliament seeks. It is understood that Miller will not be allowed to make another appearance in the House of Commons until he comes there to answer the questions. The feeling of members is that they have no more business with Miller in the role of recalcitrant witness. He will have to come prepared to talk, or stay where he is until released by prorogation. Captain Bowie, deputy Sergeant at Arms, said that up to the present time the Speaker of the House had received no request from Miller or his counsel for further hearing, and no intimation that he was willing to answer the questions asked him.

SPLENDID LECTURE BY REV. DR. GAUTHIER

(Continued from page one) have not, that is good sound education, both mental and moral. The only alternative was to raise the teachers' salary and thereby secure a better grade of teachers. Countries which have not good education, mental, moral and religious cannot be prosperous. England never denied God as a nation and was always ruled by Christian governments and her phenomenal growth is the result. Germany, Denmark and Sweden are also striking examples of the same rule, whereas France has had revolutions, all on account of becoming infidels. What England has to fear is not Germany's dreadnoughts, but her superior educational advantages. In Canada where there are differences in race and creeds harmony is absolutely essential. Eighty years ago a French man in this province was looked upon with contempt but that time has passed. The representatives of the rose, of the thistle, of the shamrock, and the fleur-de-lis now all work in perfect harmony for one great end, that is, making Canada the noblest offspring. The difference between patriotism and loyalty was here explained. They are very often confounded. Patriotism is love of country, whereas loyalty is fidelity to the sovereign. Loyalty is not a sentiment but a duty. The French Canadians since the time of their conquest are loyal, as was evidenced in the war of 1812, when, instead of joining the United States and fighting for their liberty, they stuck to the British standard. St. Paul says, "We owe allegiance to all lawfully constituted authority," and his French compatriots lived up to the teachings of holy writ.

Religion is a matter which concerns a man's relation to God and he who recantates bigotry by pen or word is one of the worst of traitors. He is the enemy of his country. More good will between the various religious denominations and nationalities is what is needed.

The lecturer brought his discourse to a happy conclusion by singing a verse written by the late Archbishop O'Brien, on "Let all the nations sing," and his singing as well as his speaking was generously applauded. R. L. Cotton moved a vote of thanks to the lecturer in fitting terms, congratulating the ladies of the Methodist Church on securing the Rev. Dr. to deliver such a fine address. The vote was seconded by Hon. W. S. Stewart, who said that P. E. Island might well feel proud of claiming Father Gauthier as one of her sons. Mr. Stewart eulogized the sterling character of the Acadian people saying that in his 35 years' experience in the course of P. E. Island he never knew of one of the race being brought to court on a criminal charge. The vote was tendered the lecturer by the chairman, G. D. Steele. Dr. Gauthier in replying to the vote of thanks expressed the hope that it might be the means of bringing all "creeds to a better understanding of each other. The National Anthem brought a most enjoyable evening to a close. The young ladies wish to thank W. R. OF SPECIAL INTEREST

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 26 (Special)—Until the United States government changes its policy there can be no development in Alaska, said J. R. McDonald, of Alaska, to a Washington Post reporter. "The report of the Commissioner of the General Land Office shows that in round numbers some three hundred and fifty coal claims have been filed, and that the claimants have proved up on something more than 36,000 acres, upon which they have paid government fees of \$10 an acre, or an aggregate of \$360,000.

These fees represent about one-tenth of the actual money expended by the men and companies that have attempted to relieve the coal situation in Alaska, and, of course, incidentally make something for themselves.

But it seems to be the policy of the Interior Department to look with suspicion upon every man who is willing to invest money in developing the natural resources of Alaska, so that we find today that of the 36,000 acres of land known to be coal

BERLIN, Feb. 25 (Special)

A trade convention representing the German Chambers of Commerce has passed a resolution in favor of the German government's petroleum monopoly bill, on condition that it be based on guarantees of an adequate supply and moderate prices, with compensation for the middlemen and employees affected by the consolidation.

The resolution, however, was strongly opposed by a powerful minority in the convention.

COLD TOO SEVERE FOR STRIKERS.

PATERSON, N. J., Feb. 26.—It was so cold here today that approximately five thousand striking silk operatives and dyers, who quit work this morning in various mills, went back to their machines within an hour. Rather than shiver in the streets. Not a mill closed its doors, but a few small dye shops suspended business. At eleven o'clock the silk mill proprietors said they were running with full forces and that less than 100 men were out.

The strikers went out for an eight-hour day at a "loom system" and a minimum wage of twelve a week. The strike order was issued by Edward Koetgegen, a general organizer of the Industrial Workers of the World. It had been predicted that 12,000 workers would go out.
