STOCK NOTES FROM KINGSTON.—R. H. Simmonds' driving mare Pansy recently dropped a fine colt sired by the well known thoroughbred, June Day. The colt is a rich dark bay, with the superb form of the sire, and is pronounced by "knowing ones" to be as near equine perfect on as anything they have ever seen. It is the first thoroughbred colt in this section, and is much admired.

The Directors of the P. E. I. Dairy Association in order to ascertain data of the work done by our best dairymen and also thereby to encourage the production of milk, offer prizes for the coming season as follows: The sum of two hundred and four dollars (\$204.00), divided equally between the three Counties, to the patrons contributing the largest amount of milk to Cheese and Butter Factories per acre of land under cultivation by them. Prizes six dollars (\$6.00) for the Cheese season and twenty-two dollars (\$22.00) for the Butter season to each County. Cheese Season.—From June 1st to November 1st, next. Prizes:—1st, \$20.00; 2nd, \$10.00; 3rd, \$7.00; 4th, \$6.00; 5th, \$5.00. Butter Season.—From November 1st next to June 1st, 1905. Prizes:—1st, \$10.00; 2nd, \$7.00; 3rd, \$5.00. Each patron competing must have at least fifteen acres of land under cultivation, and the milk produced must have an average of at least 3.5 per cent of fat. Satisfactory proof of the accuracy of the statement furnished will be required before prizes shall be awarded. Should it be found that a prize shall be awarded on an incorrect statement it shall be recalled by the Association.

Fowler, High Secretary of the I. O. F. was here lately in the interests of Forestry. Miss Annie McDonald, and Miss Sadie McLeod who have been studying mystic in Charlottetown during the past four months have arrived home. Lobsters are reported plentiful at Annandale, but herrings are scarce. Quite a number of new buildings are in the course of erection in this vicinity, including a dwelling house for G. B. Clay, H. B. Haestis, traveller for the International Harvester Co. was through this section last week.—It is understood that H. T. Duncan is negotiating with Neil McKay for the purchase of his farm. Mr. McKay has moved into his new store and he deserves great credit for his enterprise in working up such a large business in such a short time. His friends hope that he may be still more successful in the future.—The Dundas Farmers' Institute have refused to have anything to do with the proposition re the D. P. Co., as to having the hogs weighed in Charlottetown, and classified after being dressed.—The death occurred recently of Mrs. Angus MacLeod and Mrs. Malcolm Matheson. Both ladies were born in Scotland, and immigrated to this country when quite young. Mrs. MacLeod spent the last years of her life at the home of her son-in-law G. A. Robertson. She was a sister of the late Hon. Malcolm McDonald of Georgetown. Another brother Rev. D. G. McDonald is Supt. of the Baptist North West Mission Field. Mrs. Geo. Plyer of Montague is a sister. Her son the Rev. Alexander MacLeod is a missionary in India, under the Baptist Mission Board of Ontario. She has two daughters married in B. C. and two in this province. Deceased was a life long member of the Dundas Presbyterian Church, and the respect in which she was held in the community was shown by the large body of people, who despite the bad roads, attended her funeral. Mrs. Matheson had been for many years an invalid, at times suffering greatly but through it all she remained a faithful and loving wife and mother. The funeral cortege of nearly one hundred carriages was but a fitting testimony of the esteem in which she was held by her neighbors and friends.
