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Sudden Death On Saturday Of Mr. J. T. Bradley

The Guardian regrets to chronicle the sudden death on Saturday of Mr. James T. Bradley of this city. Mr. Bradley had been in ill health for some time and entered the City Hospital about a week ago suffering from acute kidney trouble. He returned to his home about one o'clock on Saturday. In the afternoon of the same day he was stricken suddenly at his home, Bayfield Street, and passed away at about 4:30 p.m. before medical assistance could arrive.

Mr. Bradley was born in Charlottetown forty-four years ago and was educated at Queen Square School. He entered the drug firm of Mr. George A. B. MacDonald which later became the firm of MacDonald and MacKinnon where he served his apprenticeship as a druggist. Four years later he went to take charge of the drugstore at Tignish owned by Sir Charles Dalton. He remained in Tignish two years, then went to Fredericton where he worked in Ryan's Drug Store. Mr. Bradley also worked at his profession in the United States for some years. Returning to Prince Edward Island, he was re-employed in the Two Macs for one year. After the death of Mr. F. B. Hennessey he went into partnership with Mr. J. P. MacDonald. Four years later the partnership was dissolved because of Mr. Bradley's ill health and he became a patient in a sanatorium in California. A year afterward he returned to the Province and some months later took a position with Reddin Bros., where he remained until his death. He is survived by his father Mr. James Bradley, Bayfield St., and two sisters, Minnie, and Mrs. George Berrigan, both of Charlottetown. The funeral will take place at 9:30 this morning at Holy Redeemer Church. Interment at Catholic Cemetery.

The Late Miss Emma Gaudet

The death occurred at her home in this City Friday afternoon of Miss Emma Gaudet, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Gaudet of Charlottetown.

Miss Gaudet for a number of years was in the millinery department of Paton's Limited, Charlottetown. Subsequently she opened up a millinery store in Moncton, and later had charge of the millinery departments of well known firms in London, Ont., Edmonton, Alta., and Kingston, Ont. Over a year ago failing health obliged her to retire from the work in which she had been engaged for some time for which she was particularly adapted and in which she proved highly efficient.

It was hoped that a prolonged rest in her native province might restore her to her former abounding health and vigor but Providence willed otherwise.

Two months ago her illness took a more serious turn and she gradually grew weaker until she peacefully passed away.

Miss Gaudet was a lady who possessed rare personal beauty and charm and was a great favorite with all who knew her. Before her health failed she had taken a keen interest in all outdoor sport and was known as one of the best lady skaters in this province. Even at the Ice Pageant last winter she was able to give an exhibition of fancy skating which was greatly admired. She was also a skilled and enthusiastic golf player.

By her fine qualities of mind and heart her optimistic temperament and lovable disposition she had made many warm friends, who will learn with deep regret the sad news of her passing when in the very prime of life.

She leaves to mourn a twin sister Mrs. R. W. Rogers, of York, South Carolina, who is at present in this city; also seven brothers: Rudolph, in Moncton, Arthur, Business Manager of the Patriot, Harry and Fred in Charlottetown, Jack, in Borden, Frank, in Rainy River, Ont., Louis in Kenora, Ont.

The family has been called upon to bear a heavy load of bereavement during the past eighteen months, another sister, Mrs. Robertson, passing away a year ago last March and the mother on June 24th. last.

They will have the deep sympathy of a very wide circle of friends both within and without this province.

Miss Gaudet will be laid to rest on Monday in the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

FLOOD-LIGHTING IS THRILLING LONDON'S MILLIONS

LONDON, Sept. 6.- (C.P. Cable)- Britain's big cities know little of the art of electric lighting on a large scale as practiced in North America but London is lighting up with a vengeance in honor of the International Illumination Congress now opening here.

London's millions in delighted wonderment yesterday saw the famous buildings of the metropolis thrown into brilliant flood-lighting after nightfall. Somerset House, usually looking so grim when daylight has departed, was ablaze with light. The first efforts were on a limited scale but tonight Buckingham Palace will be pictured in white and the adjoining Victoria Memorial will be bathed in amber. Lord Nelson will look down from his pedestal on a sea of brilliance in Trafalgar Square.

The House of Parliament will offer an enlightened outward display, which it is hoped will be symbolical of the deliberations shortly to take place when Parliament reassembles.

Canada House in Trafalgar Square has been the centre of interest by reason of its flood-lighting ever since it was opened. It was practically the only building in London so distinguished before the present efforts.

NEW DRUG FOR MALARIA

(British United Press) LONDON, Sept. 5.-By infecting himself and nine others with malaria, Colonel S. P. James, of the Ministry of Health and the Malaria Commission of the League of Nations, has proved the efficiency of a newly discovered malaria preventative.

"Plasmoquine" is the name of the new drug. On the day before infection, the volunteers were each given a dose of the drug. The next day held his forearm over the mouth of jars containing malaria-carrying mosquitoes. The mosquitoes bit them repeatedly. Then each volunteer took another dose of the drug.

Fourteen days later, when the disease should have developed, none showed any symptoms of the disease.

FARMHOUSE IS SHIFTY

(United Press) WESTPORT, Mass., Sept. 5 - Mrs. Alice Borden's farmhouse has been in three towns and two states without ever being moved. The site once was a part of the Tiverton R. I. and later belonged to Fall River, Mass., and now is in Westport.

CHINESE OFFICERS FROM JAPAN

TOKIO, Sept. 6.-China's armies, already commanded to a considerable extent by Japanese trained officers, will be increasingly Japanese. Of 338 cadets graduated from the Japanese military academy this summer, official statistics reveal that 112 were Chinese, who shortly will return to their country to command troops. A majority of the new Japanese trained officers are proteges of Generals Chiang Kai-shek and Chang Hsueh-liang, chief military figures in the Nanking government.

KANSAS FARMERS STUDY PICKLES

BUTLER, Kan., Sept. 6.-Farmers of this community envision the development of a new industry to add to their bank accounts and activity. J. Benscheld, big pickle man from Hutchinson, is urging them to raise more cucumbers. He has had to import some half a dozen carloads from Colorado annually, he said, and sees no reason why the potential pickles should not be raised in Kansas. The idea is spreading, and most farmers have their pickle patch this year.

WAR VETS CHANT PRAYERS

TOKIO, Sept. 6 - Prayers has been added to the list of methods used by disabled veterans of the Russo-Japanese War, who demand life pensions. Twenty-five veterans representing 15,000 disabled soldiers, chanted Buddhist prayers to the spirit of the late Emperor Meiji in front of the Meiji shrine here, for four days, asking that the great ruler of the war period return and grant them justice.

"Holding" Eggs Is Unwise

The Dominion Live Stock Branch are receiving many reports of serious losses taken on grading by country merchants who have held their eggs for a higher market. The holding of eggs at country points for a rising market is decidedly unwise because of the fact that storage facilities are not adequate to maintain quality in the eggs. Eggs are graded by candling before a strong light, and the grade of the egg depends on the size of the air cell. This in turn varies in accordance with the amount of CO2 or carbon dioxide given off by the egg through its shell. You can't fool the egg grader and it doesn't pay to hold.
