Several Husbands Believed Poisoned

(Special to The Guardian.)
CHICAGO, Nov. 14.—The bodies of two men and a woman, believed to have been the victims of poison plots, were examined for examination today on a criminal court order after chemists declared sufficient poison to kill several persons had been found in two of the bodies already exhumed.

Three of the five bodies that have been exhumed are those of former husbands of Mrs. Tillie Klimek whose fourth husband Joseph Klimek is in a local hospital recovering from poison which he claims was administered by his wife. One body was that of a former husband of Mrs. Nellie Sturges; Klimek said to be a neighbor and relative of Mrs. Klimek, while the body of the woman is that of Mrs. Rose Gludzevski, a cousin of Mrs. Klimek.

Charges of murder were placed against Mrs. Klimek and Mrs. Kulick today by the police, and Mrs. Klimek was booked for attempted murder, and Mrs. Kulick as an accessory in connection with the poisoning of Klimek.

Mrs. Klimek was arrested after her latest husband had been taken to a hospital and she had confessed to food in an alleged confession to the police which she later repudiated. Mrs. Klimek said she had put a "white powder" in Klimek's food and had obtained it from Mrs. Kulick.

Mrs. Kulick told the police Mrs. Klimek said she wanted the powder to kill rats.

According to the police all the former husbands of the two women carried insurance at the time of their sudden deaths, and all were stricken after partaking of elaborate feasts.

Prince Hopes To Revisit Canada

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The Prince of Wales, speaking today at a luncheon at the Canadian Club which was presided over by Hon. P.C. Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner, said it was on Nov. 10, three years ago, that he left Ottawa to embark for home at the end of a tour of the Dominions. The present occasion recalled his wonderful experiences in Canada and increased his hope that he would one day return to his many friends there.

November 11 was another anniversary, the greatest of all to be observed throughout the Empire. He always will be proud of the fact that he had served with the Canadian Corps on Armistice Day.

The Prince said that his small farm in Alberta was a great link between him and Canada, and constituted an assurance that he would one day return to that country. He could not claim that he was making in dollars, but quite recently he had received satisfactory reports from the ranch. Breeding livestock, all over the Empire had offered to supply animals, but while he was grateful, he was compelled to decline them or his outfit in Alberta would soon be like a menagerie.

Speaking of the embargo, the Prince said he was sure every body was delighted with the agreement reached concerning the admission of Canadian cattle into Great Britain. He concluded by paying a tribute to the work of the Canadian high commissioner, Hon. Mr. Larkin.

Announcement was made by the president that the Prince of Wales had consented to become one of their patrons.
