CLOSING COTTON LETTER.

(From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)

NEW YORK, Nov. 28.—The market has been very nervous today with business active. Realizing has been very heavy and at times local professionals have sold aggressively in the hope of catching stop orders at the same time there has been a certain undercurrent of business reflecting confidence in the bull position and whenever offerings have subsided the market has shown a tendency to rally. But notwithstanding this favorable undertone, we can hardly avoid the conclusion that the outside or scattering long interest has increased; there is nothing to show that the South is unwilling to sell sufficient cotton to meet all immediate requirements around these prices the trade can be by no means certain of a Government estimate below the figures already discounted which would say to be about 11,500,000 excluding linters and considering the rapidity of the advance from the recent low level, the market will look entitled to reactions of more than 15 or 20 points. New high records were made at the opening with May selling at 15.40 but the market seemed to be quite unsettled in the late trading at a decline of about 20 points from the best with rumors that there were stop orders around 14.95 for March. Southern spot markets were 1-16 lower to 5-16 higher with Savannah reporting large sales at unchanged prices. RANDOLPH. 5.25 p.m.
