Another of our pioneers has passed to the Great Beyond in the death of Thomas Trainor, Morell, on July 19th, 1943.

He was born in Fort Augustus 83 years ago. At an early age he moved with his parents to Morell. When quite a young man he went to Maine where he met and married his wife, Miss Olive Layton. However, his love for the farm was too strong and in a few years he returned to settle in Morell. Here they reared a large family of sturdy sons and daughters.

For some time he filled the position of Sheriff for King's County and his happy disposition and kindly ways made friends far and wide. He was always willing to forward any work for the good of the community and he will long be missed from the local gatherings.

In his home presided over by his kindly wife, everyone was more welcome. In his last illness he was tenderly cared for by his son Herbert and wife, particularly by his grand-son John who was always his particular favorite. His wife predeceased him five years ago.

Drive May Be On Against Jap Base At Kiska

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Speculation that the drive to throw the Japanese out of their last foothold on the American side of the Pacific may be at least in its early stages was set off today by navy secretary Frank Knox.

"No news is good news," he said when asked why there has been no navy report since July 30 on operations against Kiska Island in the Aleutians.

Knox first turned aside press conference questions on the long silence about Kiska with a suggestion that the weather could have closed in and stopped operations. Reporters reminded him that weather which might stop bombing planes need not affect the surface ships which were pounding the Japanese installations almost daily when the navy suddenly stopped

Islands of the Pacific—A Vast Battlefield

Mere dots on the map of the Pacific, these islands loom large in the war strategy leading to the eventual defeat of Japan. Each has its place in the Allied land-sea-air attack picture. Paramushiru, Jap base in the Kuriles, has been bombed twice, while Kiska, the enemy's last foothold in the Aleutians, has been shelled and bombed repeatedly in a prelude to invasion. Wake has been raided by Navy and Army bombers seven times—Yanks in New Georgia are cleaning out the last Jap positions at Balrook after victory at Munda, and Vila is next on the attack list. The big enemy naval-air base at Truk is a future objective, while positions in the Rabaul area have been recently attacked by MacArthur's airmen. Bougainville, next big island in the Solomons, is a potential invasion target. Jap bases in this area have undergone many raids.
