AFTER being in the Straits since Monday morning the Stanley reached Georgetown yesterday at 11 a. m. with seven cars hay and four passengers including Oswald Gordon, John Gordon and W. W. Jenkins. There was no special to the city as there was no mail.

The Guardian has received the 47th annual report of the Institute for the Deaf and Dumb, Halifax, N. S. The treasurer's report shows that for the year the cost of maintenance exceeded the income by \$700, which, added to the deficits of the last two or three years, places the Institute about \$2,000 in debt. An appeal is made to the public for assistance to enable the directors to clear off this debt. The total attendance for the year was 111, six of whom belonged to P. E. Island.

SPAKING before the North Sydney Town Council recently Capt. J. A. Farquhar, Halifax gave much valuable information as to what his company and the Dominion Government were likely to do towards procuring the dry dock scheme. This project of a railway dry dock had been spoken of in North Sydney for the past two years. Mr. Crandall, an expert in matters of this sort had been sent there and after an extensive investigation, Capt. Farquhar sent in a statement to the town council saying that he would need a bonus of \$2,500 a year for 15 years, and exemption from taxation for the same period. The cost of building the dock, purchase of the necessary site, fitting up shops etc., would be in the vicinity of \$250,000. He had also been working with the government for a bonus towards the establishment of a wrecking vessel and plant in conjunction with the dock. If he was successful in this matter he would expect free taxation and water for the additional enterprise.

MASONIC Official Visitation of Deputy Grand Master C. H. S. Sterns.—On the courteous invitation of St. John's Lodge the brethren of Victoria Lodge joined with them Tuesday evening and both Lodges were officially visited by the Deputy Grand Master. The latter bore the greetings of the Grand Master who was at present in California, whose return with that of his good lady might be expected in June. The Lodge room was crowded and long applause finished the happy and helpful speech. R. W. Bro. R. M. Johnson, Grand Lecturer, spoke very briefly, and, later R. W. Bro. W. K. This year it came in mild and out mild, but the unprecedented quantity of snow has rendered work in the country nearly impossible, and roads are now practically impassable being over and under banks feet in length, softened by the mild weather, through which horses can neither swim or walk. Pedestrians make short journeys only when absolutely necessary, hence business and traffic are nearly as bad as during the snow blockade of winter.—The efficient mail courier, Charles Young, has been unable to make his regular trips, and a dearth of news from the outside world gives our country districts a taste of isolation, unknown previous to this winter.—Some of the last papers received from the outside world were two months old.—The general health of the inhabitants here is good, fortunately but little sickness prevailing.—A. W. Bruce who has been confined to his house for some time is gradually improving.—Rev. J. W. Gairdner preaches with his old time vigor every Sunday if it is possible for the people to congregate. The honest face of Deacon Scott has been missing an odd Sunday, the snows of more than four score winters beginning to tell on his once vigorous frame.—The small birds arrived here from their winter quarters in the South on the 30th March, earlier than the average, and a wintry reception to boot.

WILL BE REORGANIZED.

MONTREAL, March 31.—The directors of the Dominion Coal Co. have made an agreement with the banking interests for the reorganization of the company's finance. The company will issue \$5,000,000 bonds and \$3,000,000 preferred stock and with the proceeds all the present bonds, preferred stock and indebtedness to the Dominion Steel Company will be taken up.
