

TRACK NEWS.—Local horsemen are urging the exhibition speed committee to give a trotting meeting on the track on June 1st, with free admission and a charge only for the grand stand. Harry Lydiard will hardly race Border this season as both are under suspension. Border was entered at Memphis early last season but failed to start, and raced all through the season under protest. The National Association rules are that under the circumstances all the money won by the horse, about \$1,000, must be paid back before horse or owner can go on the National Association track. The exhibition track is in pretty good condition. Frank Bottiller has Redlight, Starlight, Shelia Mack and three other horses there and Peter Carroll is working Burby and two others. Mr. Cowan's Redlight and Springhill is reported in good shape and two new horses are working over it.—Halifax Chronicle.

Sir Alexander Mackenzie, who has so ably conducted at the Musical Festival concerts throughout the Dominion, brought his visit to Canada to a close, today, by leaving for Montreal. He was accompanied by Miss Ethel Wood, and Mr. Wm. A. Vigney, two of the principal artists connected with the festival. In speaking of his tour through Canada, Sir Alexander said "It has been a wonderful experience. I have been surprised and delighted at what I have seen and heard. I did not hope for such splendid results. In small places particularly, I was surprised to find a good knowledge of music and splendid training. The Canadian notes are of fine quality, in fact, considerably above the average. What pleased me very much was the whole-souled interest which all the chorists took in their work, and if this movement is continued, Canada will take the place in the musical world to which she belongs. When asked whether he intended ever to return to Canada, he replied, I hope so very much, goes well to be back here on a similar ground in two years time."

The prospects for a very large attendance at the Abegweit Excursion to New Glasgow on Monday are excellent, and it is likely that hundreds will enjoy the beautiful sail and witness an exciting game of football between our champions and the representatives of Nova Scotia.

The forestry problem seems likely at an early date to command some of the attention which its practical importance now warrants. At the last meeting of the Canada Forestry Association, the organization was completed by the election of His Honor, Governor S. Oxball, as vice-president of New Brunswick; Father Burke, for Prince Edward Island; and Dr. A. H. McKay, for Nova Scotia. Just what steps will next be taken is something to be considered and we are advised that the initial move will be the holding of a convention at some central point. The forest areas of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia are yet more than proportionately large, but the Island is sorely wanting and it is being found that many of the depleted areas of the other two provinces have scant other value. A more careful system of managing our woodlands will, beyond all doubt, prolong their usefulness. The last session of the Island legislature passed an act empowering the ministry to undertake certain measures, elsewhere referred to, and we join the friends of the movement in the hope that some early steps will be taken to secure an adjustment of this great source of wealth, in so far as it affects the farmers by its growth or removal.—Maritime Farmer.

The Golf Club expect to have a large gathering of people on their grounds on May 25th, the opening day, and it is probable that a handicap tournament will be arranged for on that occasion. The grounds have been rolled by the steam roller, and since the rain the work about the putting greens and tees will be completed. Messrs. Lowe Bros., who have the contract for the erection of the club house have commenced hauling the lumber. This building will have a verandah in front of about 40 feet long and 8 feet wide, and on the southeast side the verandah will be six feet in width. The house will contain one large room 30x16, opening with two large sliding doors on to the verandah. This room is to have an open fire place large enough to burn logs of wood. In the rear of the house will be two large dressing rooms for ladies and gentlemen, also a kitchen about 15 x 9, and a small room for stores, etc. The large room will have two bay windows of considerable size. The floor of the verandah will be 3ft 6inches above the ground. The club house will command a beautiful view of the river and the entire golf links.—Can.
