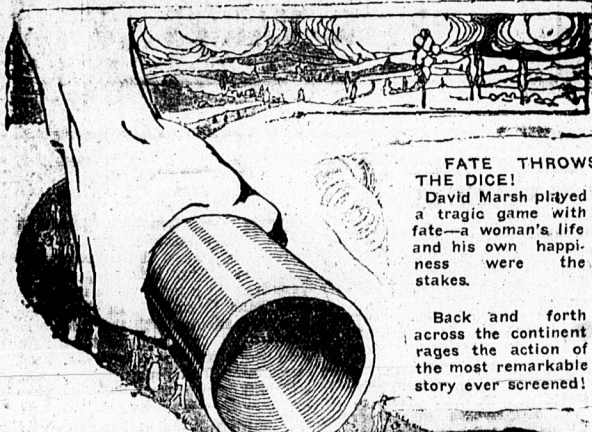

AT ANNIVERSARY SERVICE.—Rev. Principal MacKinnon of Halifax Presbyterian College, delivered the oration at the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the birth of the great Scottish novelist and poet, Sir Walter Scott, held in Hall on Monday evening under the auspices of the North-West Society of that city. Rev. A. L. Fraser, of Park Street Presbyterian church, contributed an original sonnet to the occasion.

INTERESTING TRIP.—Superintendent of Chinese coolies across the continent from Vancouver to Halifax has been the unusual experience of Mr. D. McFadyen of Vancouver, B. C., who is on a few weeks' visit to his former home at West River, N. S. McFadyen is a railway employe on the Pacific Coast and while coming here on his holidays took charge of the coolies who were safely landed in Halifax and there put through medical examination preliminary to deportation to Europe. Mr. McFadyen arrived in the city Saturday night and his wife and child were registered at the Revere Hotel.

A POLICE HUNT.—An alarm of thieves or possible murderers started the people of New Brunswick, New Brunswick, N. S. Characters were seen loitering suspiciously in fields and woods and a vacant barn. Word was sent to the police at Summerside and Kennington. Officer Todd of the former and Officer Moore of the latter with several constables promptly responded, coming to the scene in autos a little after midnight. The police had both been officially notified previously of thieves and a murderer whom the authorities in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and the United States were looking for with offers of reward for their capture. The police were both well armed, not knowing the kind of characters they were going to be up against, and were determined to get them at any risk. Approaching the barn at which the suspects were last seen the officers entered cautiously and in stentorian tones demanded that the unseasoned occupants surrender themselves. No response being received, they examined many corners of the building still without avail. Again demanding that the occupants show themselves and accompanying the demand with several revolver shots the two suspects slowly resurged themselves from a deep and comfortable rest in the hay on one of the highest lofts and asked what the trouble was. The police ordered them to come down immediately but one of them daringly replied "you can't scare me." A flash light was thrown upon the two men who revolvers in the hands of the police gleamed menacingly and the man who could not be scared was the first to come down, followed closely and tremblingly by his companion. The police examined them carefully, and were disappointed to find that they had captured only two ordinary wayfarers who had been looking for work and skillfully dodging it. As there was nothing otherwise suspicious about them the police ordered them to leave the vicinity at once which they did.

GATHERING OF THE CLAN MUTCH.—The "Mutch" picnic held at home of David Mutch, Mt. Herbert, on Saturday, August 6th, was really a gathering of a great clan. Members of the third, fourth, fifth and sixth generations of the family name of Mutch were present. A historical sketch of the family, prepared and read by Mr. Robert Mutch, Mt. Herbert, was a most interesting feature of the afternoon. Mr. Alexander Mutch, the original founder of the family in P. E. Island, was a soldier of the British army who fought with the British forces. He and his brother John fought at the Battle of Bunker Hill, but John failed to answer the roll call after the battle. In 1778 Alexander Mutch came to P. E. Island with General Fanning and Private Gardner, his rank being that of Major and lived at Rocky Point for one year. He then settled at Mt. Herbert and the original farm is now occupied by Mr. David Mutch, Mr. John Mutch and Mr. Mann. More than one hundred and thirty descendants were present at the picnic, seventy-five of whom bore the name "Mutch". It is the intention of the "clan" to make the picnic an annual affair and to endeavor to get all the members of the family together at least once a year. The original Alexander Mutch came from Aberdeen-shire to fight in the Revolutionary war. He was married twice and had fifteen children.

CHAMPION DANGERS AND PIPERS WEDNESDAY

Reports from the executive in charge of the Caledonian Club Scottish Gathering state that the prospect for Wednesday is of the most rosy description.

The Caledonian Club's newly organized Pipe Band will head the procession from the Club rooms at 12:30 p. m. The band has been provided with new uniforms, and there are new pipes and drums. For the occasion it will be strengthened by the addition of several pipers from a distance.

Odors Intoxicating In Burton-on-Trent

If the staunchest teetotaler traveled on one of the boats which bring fruit from the continent, to England at this time of the year, he might be quite unfit to attend a Band of Hope meeting shortly afterwards.

The fumes from the fruit produce a form of intoxication which is indistinguishable by the average person from ordinary drunkenness. So powerful is this effect in the case of strawberries that vessels laden with them will not carry passengers, and the crews are not allowed to go below except when absolutely necessary.

It is a very real risk of getting drunk without drinking at places where alcoholic liquors are made or stored. A man who is accustomed to drinking intoxicants can visit such a place with impunity, whereas a life-long teetotaler may be incapacitated by breathing the air there.

Burton-on-Trent is a particularly bad town for abstainers, because the fumes from its many great breweries will produce all the symptoms of intoxication in a man who has never tasted alcoholic liquor in his life. Many men have become highly indignant on being chaffed about their condition after a "dry" walk through the streets of the town.

The most dangerous places, however, for those who do not wish to be accused or suspected of tupples are the wine and spirit vaults at docks. At Liverpool a short time ago a man collapsed after leaving a vault where large quantities of rum are stored, in spite of the fact that he had not tasted a drop of rum, or any other alcoholic liquor.
