Evidence was given by Mrs. Elizabeth McFadyen, her daughter Ethel and Dr. A. S. Simpson of Stanley. Mrs. McFadyen, who is a widow, told a story which it is not advisable to publish. She naturally gave the unpleasant details very reluctantly. Her daughter Alma, the victim in the case, was present in Court. She is nine years old, and has been deaf for the past three years. She can understand by the motion of the lips, what her mother says, and can talk to her. She told the latter what had happened on the afternoon of December 4th, stating that Burgoyne had asked her to go down from the river, which is about 25 yards from the house, and that the alleged deed was committed there. The prisoner was sent up to the next term of the Supreme Court.
