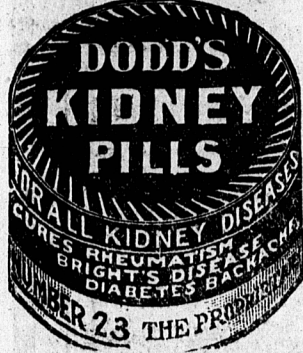

SENSATIONAL TRIAL

MONTREAL, June 6—The case of John Cummings, on trial for the murder of his wife last November, will probably go to the jury tomorrow. Mrs. Donald Cameron, mother-in-law of the accused; Edwin L. Packer, a young man who was walking with Mrs. Cummings when the fatal shots were fired, and Chief Carpenter, who secured a confession from the accused, were examined at length today.

The afternoon session of the court, when Mrs. Cameron took the stand, was dramatic in the extreme and Cummings, the accused, was probably the only person in the court room who maintained absolute composure. Ever when Mrs. Cameron shook her fist at him and cried: "May God forgive you, for I will not, and I later told how her daughter had lived in fear of her husband and had on one occasion said to her, 'Don't you leave the house, mother, for you will get killed as well as me, and there will be nobody to look after the children, Cummings only smiled slightly and showed no other trace of emotion. Mrs. Cameron testified that her daughter and her husband had lived together until she had learned that Cummings had another wife in Scotland. The husband had left and had boarded at various places in the city. He had at times drunk heavily. Packer, at the morning session, told how he had heard Mrs. Cummings express fear of her husband and now he had escorted her from the factory where she worked on the night of the alleged murder. Cummings appeared and fired two shots, one entering the head and the other the back, the woman dying as a result.

NO LESSONS FROM THE TITANIC WRECK.

LONDON, June 6—The disaster to the steamer Titanic has done little to alter the view of Harold A. Sanderson, a director of the White Star line, as to the efficiency of the present equipment of trans-atlantic steamers for all practical purposes. The wreck committee today and disputed the usefulness of additional life-boats, of searchlights, binoculars and larger crews of seamen, but he added:—

There is a popular cry for binoculars and extra boats, and we want to satisfy it. There are, continued Mr. Sanderson, certain risks coming from the sea which it would be impossible to eliminate, just as there are on land.

The witness emphasized the fact that small boats were carried only for the purpose of transferring persons from ship to ship, or from ship to land, and said that if more additional boats, they would have nothing to do until there was a wreck. Searchlights, he declared, would be worse than useless. There would be a positive source of danger. The worst thing possible for a lookout is the glare of light.

Questioned regarding the space given up for the accommodations of wealthy passengers, Sanderson replied:—

If there were anything more than we could do to ensure the safety of passengers, the millionaire's suites would not stand in the way.

He attributed the greater loss of life among the third class passengers

of the Titanic to the fact that the best position for launching the boats happened to be the nearest the first and second class quarters.

FISHERMEN PERISH.

CANSO, June 6—The Lunenburg schooner Calavera, Captain Young, arrived here today with her flag at half mast, reporting the loss by drowning of two of her crew. The accident took place on May 22 while fishing at Cape North. The unfortunate men were Geo. Meisner, of Chester, and Bernard Young, son of Captain Young, of Lunenburg, both unmarried. The Calavera left for home today with 650 quintals.
