

Abbies Square Series For Island Title

Two runs in the home half of the fifth followed by three more in the seventh, marked the defeat of the Summerside Curran and Briggs by the local Abbies as the latter squared the series with the construction crew at a game apiece. The game was the second in the seven-game final series for the Island senior baseball crown. It was played on the Memorial Field diamond yesterday afternoon before a very large crowd of fans.

Johnny Higson and "Buck" Whitlock both singled home runs in the fifth to spell defeat for the visitors. Goodwin crossing the plate on Higson's safety and MacAleer coming home on Whitlock's drive. In the opening frame the locals tallied their first run on the strength of Whitlock's double after Higson had reached first on the third baseman's error. MacAleer sacrificed Higson to second where "Buck" doubled him home. In the top half of the fifth Mulholland scored the only Summerside run of the game. He reached first via MacAleer's sacrifice and went to second when Gaudet walked. He scored minutes later as Gallant drove a sin-

gle into right field. The locals added their final three runs of the game in the bottom half of the seventh. Higson singled and went to second when MacAleer followed suit. Johnny then went to third when the throw from the short-stop to first went by the first baseman. Whitlock then walloped his second two-base hit of the game to score both runners, he himself going to third on the throw to the plate and scoring on a passed ball.

"Lefty" MacAleer went the route for the Abbies and pitched a five-hit ball game. He whiffed two and walked three others. Pony Daley started for the C. & B. crew but retired in favour of Joe Bernard in the fifth after the Abbies had scored their second and third runs. Daley allowed three hits while walking one and striking out five. Bernard was touched for five hits. He struck out four local batters.

The game featured some real good ball by both teams with the fielding side of the game being a little better than the batting. Some of the hits charged against the pitchers were of the scratchy variety. Whitlock's smash in the seventh was the longest out of the game. All five hits of MacAleer were of the one-base variety.

With terrific stretch battles predominating in almost every heat the night racing program held Saturday night at "Canada's Finest Track" again provided a good sized crowd of fans with spectacular duels of speed as the cream of the Island's trotters and pacers battled it out from wire to wire in a fine racing program.

Pacing a storm all the way Carl Frisco, owned by P. J. Cadegan of Glace Bay provided the biggest upset of the program when he raced off with both dashes against a field composed of Neil Kalmuck, Joseph Hoosier and Vella La Vella in the featured event on the card.

The four bearcats of the racing oval provided stirring competition in both trips. In the first heat Carl Frisco got away on top to make every post a winning one as Neil Kalmuck came with a terrific burst of speed the final eighth to cop the runner-up position. The second heat was even more nerve tingling as Carl, Neil and Vella La Vella came down the stretch almost like a team in a driving finish with the Frisco horse again being just a shade too good for the fast closing Neil and Vella La Vella.

In the other handicap events on the card Baron and Buddy Budlong, continuing their season long duels split the two miles. Baron trotting steadily all the way was half a length to the left in the second trip Buddy colored him in the stretch to trot off with the heat in another rousing finish.

Oregon Golfer Wins Can. Women's Title

VANCOUVER, Aug. 28 (CP)—The Canadian women's open golf championship is back in the United States after a thrilling all-American final at Capilano golf course here.

Gracie DeMoss, 21-year-old coed from Corvallis, Ore., won the Duchess of Connaught gold cup on the 35th green Saturday as she defeated Mrs. Marian Herron of Portland, Ore., 2 and 1.

It was a hard one to lose for Mrs. Herron, 33-year-old mother of three and six-time winner of the Pacific northwest title.

Down five holes at one point, she fought back with everything she had in the final 18 holes of the eight-hour 36-hole final to reduce the deficit to two holes.

The match was dramatic two going into the 17th and both were on the fringe of the green on the long-par-five hole with their second shots. Mrs. Herron pitched to within five feet and sank her putt for a birdie.

Miss DeMoss, needing only a half, sank a four-footer to tie the hole, win the match and the championship.

Smith & Cullen Win Doubles Title

The Smith and Cullen combination, favored to take the match, came through as expected in the first set by a 6-3 count, but were set back on their heels by Nicholson and Crew in the second when they drove back steadily to reverse the scoring in the second and show signs of making it a nip-and-tuck affair. Settling down to their steady mode of play in the third, however, the more experienced Smith and Cullen consistently kept throwing the ball back to their opponents who lost most of their points by eventually banging it out of bounds or into the net, to take the next two sets hand running by 6-2, 6-3 counts.

With the play developing into a "return the ball and let the others make the mistake" style of play, both teams nevertheless came through at times with some really excellent driving placements and tricky net play, which added considerably to an otherwise dull contest.

A special presentation ceremony will be held at the clubhouse on Wednesday afternoon when the various division winners and runners-up will receive their prizes.
