Esquires Take Game Lead In Junior Finals With 6-1 Win Over Canadiens

The hurling dominance which Bill Sherry has held over the Canadiens all season once again was in evidence last night as the young Junior Esquires right-handed, allowing but five hits in the six inning encounter pitched by the team to a 6-1 victory in the opening game of the finals of the City Junior Baseball League.

Staked to a four run lead in the second inning as the winners forced young Alkie McCormack to the showers. Sherry working smoothly and easily pitched himself out of dangerous looking positions in the third and fourth frames as Canadiens' McCormack was unable to hold his opponents to one run and win under wraps as the winners got to Murphy in the fifth for the final two outs of the game.

Again it was a case of the steadier team winning. After a scoreless first inning McCormack walked the first man to face him in the second and the second inning. Two successive errors allowed the sacks without a hit being made and as the next batter faced the pitcher the side was again in the lead. The Canadiens first baseman attempted to cut off the run. Another error let in the second run as McCormack was accounting for the first out of the inning on strikes and then with two mates on the paths Jack Coyle sent both over the plate as he walloped a terrific triple to centre field. The blow ended Canadiens' starting pitcher's tenure on the mound and Emmett Murphy, coming in from right field showed a bit of class relief by hitting as he retired the side by fanning the next two batters. Touched for only one hit in the following three frames Murphy saw his mates fail to come through in the clutch in the third and fourth frames. In the third they had runners on second and third with only one out but Sherry stretched to retire the side with a drive one runner home as Sherry this time came through with two strikeouts for the final two outs of the frame.

After his brilliant relief hurling Esquires caught up to Murphy in the fifth. Three consecutive hits plus two errors sent two runs across before the first out was made but the uprising died down quickly as Sherry regained his poise whiffed the next three batters in a row. Canadiens went out in order in the fifth and the best they could do was to push a runner as far as second base where he was left stranded.

Kaye Don And Gar Wood End 7-Year Feud

(By Paul Mickelson) (Associated Press Sports Writer) NEW YORK, Aug. 31—Two strange bedfellows of sport broke bread and sipped an Italian coun's champagne today as they patched over a seven-year feud that caused an international incident seven years ago.

Chief characters were Gar Wood, the silver fox of Hollywood trophy fame, and Kaye Don, British sportsman who almost lost his life because of the sly Wood's racing skill druggery in 1931.

Here to greet Count Theo Rossi, Monteleone of Italy, now the United States to try for the famous gold cup speed boat honors over the Detroit River course on Labor Day, Wood and Don toasted across the water as they parted. Wood, a broad smile, The one who wore a scotchman as a sportsman, He believed, had been erased.

Perhaps no sports event ever caused as much international criticism as the Wood-Don incident, a British war hero, had come to Detroit with a remarkable boat, Miss Englied, 3rd, to challenge Wood who then rode the watery waters as Bobby Jones did the bunkers of golf.

But the sly Wood figured out a scheme to fool the Englishman. He did it all over the trick almost cost Don his life.

Wood entered two boats in the race. As the skills jockeyed toward the starting line, Wood's second boat beat the starter's gun over the starting line. It was a neat deuce, Don shot his boat across, too, and it was all over that, his second qualified, along with Wood's deuce boat, the cagy Wood sent his craft across the line cracked up time. Victory was easy. In the ensuing mixup, Don cracked up. Medical skill saved his life, as sportsmen do. More than that, he was fined and dined with the man he once fooled, sportsmen applauded and the near-tragic incident was forgotten.

In the 221 Class, Miss Victoria, Power Bros., Wellington McNeill took first money, capturing the first, placing second in the middle heat and finishing up first place in the final heat.

There was considerable delay in starting the opening heat of the 221 class as starter Budd had to call the horses back eight times before getting them away to a good start.

In the only running races of the day Promethius owned by E. E. Adams with jockey Bert Bremner up, won his second race in as many starts by leading the field throughout. A great battle was staged for second place between Riffle and Ernie Beach with Riffle coming up fast in the last 20 yards to win out.

World Records Broken In Grand Circuit Races

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Aug. 31—(AP)—Two world records were broken and another equaled while a 17-year-old track record also fell in Grand Circuit races at the New York State Fair today.

Her Ladyship, owned by hotelier Baker Stables, Charles, Ky., and driven by the owner's son, equalled her own world record for pacing mares when she covered the first heat of the 2:14 pace in 1:58 1/4 and came back with miles in 1:58 1/2 and 1:59 1/4 for a world's three-heat record for a pacer.

Roseline, 1926, Hamiltonian winner, trotted a mile in 1:57 1/4 accompanied by a prompter to cut two full seconds from her own 1:58 1/4 and established a new world's record for trotting mares.

The bay mare, owned by Gibsons, of Lexington, Ky., and driven by the owner's son, Ben White, also erased the track record of 1:58 set here in 1921 by the Great Peter Manning.

Billie Direct, world's champion pacer, scored a straight heat victory in the \$2,000 2:07 pace, with Yo Fleming of Dundas, Ont., handling the reins.
