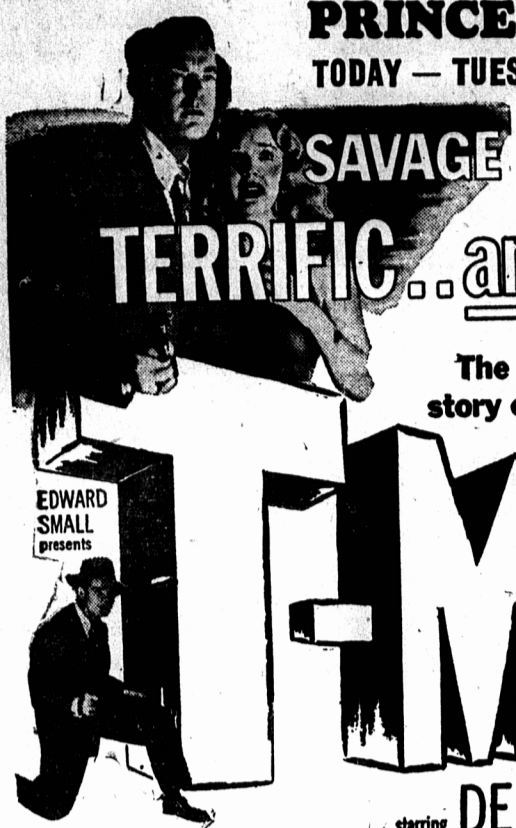

First Canadian Cattle Shipped By Air To Europe

The first direct air shipment of Canadian cattle to Europe left Montreal March 28. It consisted of twelve richly-bred purebred Holsteins, seven bulls and five heifers. Accompanying the cattle were G. M. Clemens, Secretary of the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada, and Albert Stagg, Oakville, Ont. They will spend a month studying the possibilities of developing a large scale market for Canadian Holsteins in Italy. Their visit is on the invitation of Fratello Fico, President, Italian Livestock Association.

Mr. Stagg selected the cattle which are the forerunners of a shipment of 195 Holsteins scheduled to leave for Italy in May. This is the first large order for Canadian cattle received from Italy and comes as a direct result of the satisfaction of Italian breeders with the four Holsteins bulls purchased from Canada a year ago, and which were the first Canadian Holsteins exported to Italy.

Included in the present air shipment are: three bulls and two heifers from J.J.E. McCague, Allison; 1 bull and two heifers from Elmcroft Farms, Oshawa; one bull each from H. L. Culbert, Vercheres, Que. and Graymar Farms, Oakville, Ont.; and one heifer each from Dymont Bros., Jerseyville, Ont. and Howard Gowland, Milton, Ont. The Italian buyers are: Count Gaetano Marzotto, Portofuraro, eight head; Dr. Leonardo Albertini, Naples, three head; and Pier Francesco Talenti, Rome, one bull. The McCague cattle consisted of three sons of the noted "Marksmen", a grand-daughter of Marksmen and a daughter of Abegweit Showdown. From Elmcroft came a son of "Triune" out of the \$4,000 All-Canadian, Elmcroft Hiemke Monogram, a daughter of the Century Sire "Monogram" and a daughter of Montvic Emile Lochinvar. The Graymar bull is a son of the \$10,000 Abegweit Mildred from a Raymondale Ideal Successor daughter; the Culbert bull is a son of the XXXX Montvic Emperor Ajax. The bull bred by Dymont Bros. is a son of the \$20,000 "Historian" from a "Sovereign" daughter of the excellent cow Springvale Irene Canary Echo.

R.C.M.P. Officers Rescued After Ordeal in North

OTTAWA, April 3 (CP) - Man's struggle in the north goes on unabated but his battle against the frozen wastes continues to be one of courage and perseverance. So reads the story of two R. C. M. P. officers, lost for 18 days in Canada's sub-Arctic, whose rescue was announced by R. C. M. P. and army headquarters last night. Even as the rescue was announced, a mercy flight was underway in another part of the north to aid two Eskimo children mangled by dogs. And at the same time a plane took off from Churchill, Man., to speed supplies to starving Eskimos in the Arctic, left without equipment. The R. C. M. P. officers, identified only as Cpl. Ivan Rolstone and Special Constable George Powder, were back at Fort Reliance today, a Northwest Territories station of the eastern army of Great Slave Lake. They were found March 29 at Sandy Lake, 70 miles east of Fort Reliance, after 18 days of wandering in storms and sub-zero weather, trying to find their way back to the post. When located, the officers' team of 12 huskies had been reduced to three. The other nine had starved to death. The team and the two officers had set out earlier this winter from Fort Reliance on one of the longest patrols in the north—from Fort Reliance 600 miles southward to Beverhill Lake, about 300 miles east of Edmonton.

TREASURY'S TOUGH 'T-MEN' HEROES OF STARTLING DRAMA When "T-Men" power-packed drama based on actual Treasury Department records, opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre, the American public, for the first time, will obtain an intimate glimpse into the workings of that least publicized of all governmental agencies - the Treasury Department. Despite the lack of fanfare, the Treasury Department is probably the most relentless law enforcement agency in the country. It is responsible for the convictions of Al Capone, Waxy Gordon, Nucky Johnson, Bruno Hauptmann and other notorious criminals. "T-Men," which stars Dennis O'Keefe, is based on a compilation of three actual cases from the files of the Treasury Department and was filmed with the assistance of the law enforcement agency. The film details the operations of a pair of T-Men who go "under cover" to track down a nationwide counterfeit ring. As far as possible, the entire picture was filmed in the actual cities where the original action took place. Camera units were sent to Chicago, Washington, New York, Boston, Montreal and Detroit. Elmer L. Trev, recently retired chief co-ordinator of the various Law Enforcement agencies of the Treasury Department, is featured in the opening and closing sequences in this shock-filled expose of the underworld at work. To heighten the authenticity of Edward Small's production, which is being released by Eagle Lion Films, the Treasury Department gave its permission to film U. S. currency, liquor stamps and many other items previously prohibited. Heading the supporting cast of the film are Mary Meade, promising film newcomer; Alfred Ryder, Broadway stage actor; Wally Ford, screen veteran character player; June Lockhart, sensation of the current Broadway season, and Charles McGraw, of "Killers" fame. Aubrey Schenck produced; Anthony Mann directed; and John C. Higgins wrote the screenplay.
