There will be sorrow amongst a large circle of friends occasioned by the passing away of Mrs. W. A. O. Morson, who entered into rest at the Charlottetown Hospital early on Sunday morning.

Mrs. Morson had been a sufferer for a number of years, and after treatment in Montreal and long continued care in home surroundings, she entered in May last the Home-wood Sanitarium at Guelph, Ontario. But continuing to grow weaker and hope having been given up of ultimate recovery, the decision was made last week that she should be brought home, and she arrived on Saturday night, by thorough pullman from Hamilton. Apparently she had stood the journey well, and relatives hoped that she should be spared to them for a time at least.

But early on Sunday morning, the summons came and her spirit quietly passed to Him who gave it. Mrs. Morson was the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theophilus DesBrisay, of Spring Park, Bright and vivacious, she was always a leader in social and church activities, and made many friends.

Four sisters cherish her memory. Mrs. Hodgson, Mrs. Simpson, Mrs. Watson and Mrs. DesBrisay and the late Mrs. Robert DeBlois was another of the family.

Her children died in childhood and her illness began shortly after, if not before the passing away of Mrs. Morson seven years ago. The funeral service is to be held at St. Peter's Cathedral on Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock, preceded by a requiem celebrated at 7.45.

Yesterday's services in St. Paul's were appropriate to the Christian season of Epiphany. As the Church Bulletin states "The Christian season of Epiphany takes its name from two Greek words meaning 'showing forth'." It commemorates the visit of the Magi from the East to the infant Jesus in Bethlehem. Its theme is the sending of the Everlasting Gospel to the Gentile world.

The service of the Holy Communion was held at 8.30 a. m. At 11.00 o'clock there was Morning Prayer with hymns suitable to the day. The lessons were taken from Isaiah 44 and the first chapter of St. John's Gospel.

Rev. H. D. Raymond preached an Epiphany sermon, from the Great Communion Matt. 28:19 "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, of the Son and of the Holy Ghost."

At the evening service the hymns "As with gladness men of old," "The people that in darkness sat" and "Jesus shall reign" were sung heartily. The choir rendered the anthem "Send out Thy Light" by Edmund. There were missionary lessons from Isaiah 45 and St. Paul's Epistle to the Colossians. The sermon text was Colossians 1:28 "That ye may present every man perfect in Christ Jesus."

The Markets

OTTAWA, Jan. 8.—(Eggs)—A bright feature of the Canadian egg markets at the present time is the very strong consumptive demand prevailing throughout the country while values have been forced down ward recently through increasing production. This demand has served to keep stocks fairly well cleared. This heavy consumption lends an encouragement as prices to the market.

TORONTO—This market is still nervous and unsettled. Dealers are quoting country shippers extra 45-46, firsts 35-42, seconds 29-30 delivered. Prices of fresh eggs to retailers are extra 58-60, firsts 50-51, seconds 32.

Montreal—Brokers are today offering B. C. eggs at extra 50-51, firsts 47-49, pullets extra 47-48.

EDMONTON.—The egg market here is steady with local and B. C. fresh selling to retailers at firsts 55. Pullet extras 53.

MONTREAL, Jan. 8.—There was some demand from the United Kingdom for Canadian Western oats here Saturday, but as the prices bid were below working basis no business resulted. The trade in each grain locally was also slow and prices were unchanged.

Business was done in spring and winter wheat grades of flour but the undertone was steady. The milled market was moderately active and prices were firm. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was not so active. Little outside of some business that was transacted with United States buyers in western October cheese and current receipts of no one white and colored at 19 to 19 1-4 the market was quiet. The receipts were 248 boxes. An old feeling again prevailed in the butter trade but there was no further change in prices. The demand was quiet and little business was transacted. The egg market was without any new feature, prices being unchanged with a slight trade passing. Receipts were 1215 cases. Potatoes and bean markets not available tonight.
