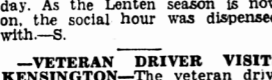

At six o'clock the men and women assembled and stood in their places while Rev. George Ayers asked the blessing which was followed by the toast to the King, proposed by Mr. J. M. Nicholson, the Senior Elder of the congregation. The banquet prepared by the ladies was much appreciated by those who had for some years been exposed to mess halls.

During the banquet a lively sing-song was enjoyed with Mr. Albert Rustis at the piano. Mr. J. M. U.N.O. May Be Asked To Consider Spanish Question

 LONDON, March 8 — (CP Cable) — Despite opposition of other major powers, France or Russia may bring the question of Franco Spain before the United Nations Security Council at its next session, opening in New York March 21.

In their recent joint statement on Spain, Britain, France and the United States expressed strong disapproval of the Franco regime. The statement however, also emphasized they had no desire to interfere in Spain's internal problems. Later this week, Britain, stating she was not in favor of bringing the question of Franco's continuance in power before the Security Council, indicated that she hoped the Spanish people themselves would oust Franco.

On the other hand the Soviet Union now is lined up with France on the latter's proposal to submit the question to the Security Council as a threat to international security.

While the United States has not been heard from as yet, Britain maintains Spain is no such threat and it would be a misuse of the council to discuss it there.

There will be considerable diplomatic negotiation on this point before the council opening although it appears that France or Russia may take this step, particularly because the recent joint declaration by the United States, Britain and France criticizing the Franco regime fell so flat.

The mildly-worded declaration met criticism in Britain. Later an authority here on foreign policy said in an interview that long-range hopes for a change in Spain boil down to getting part of the Spanish army to break with Franco and the big powers eventually will have to recognize this.

London generally believes there is no chance of Franco losing his grip in Spain within the near future and the Spanish conundrum is the most puzzling problem the British Gov't is faced with apart from relations with Russia.

Gunman Robs Montreal Hospital

MONTREAL, March 8 — (CP) — A lone gunman who followed Napoleon Durandeau, accountant of the Ste. Jeanne d'Arc Hospital, up the institution's front stairs today, poked a revolver in the man's ribs and seized a brief case containing \$2,860, the hospital pay roll.

Durandeau was returning from a bank when the gunman came up behind him. After seizing the case with the money, the man, described as being about 35 years old, fled.

South African Gov't Wins In By-Election

CAPE TOWN, Mar. 8 — (CP Cable) — The parliamentary by-election yesterday at Caledon, Cape Province, which was won by the United Party, saw one of the most hectic campaigns in South Africa for a considerable time.

The seat was won by E. G. P. Delport with a 446-vote majority over L. H. Fick, Nationalist. The Nationalists were hoping to win three in a row from Prime Minister Smuts' Government, having taken Wakkerstroom in 1944 and Kimberley District last year.

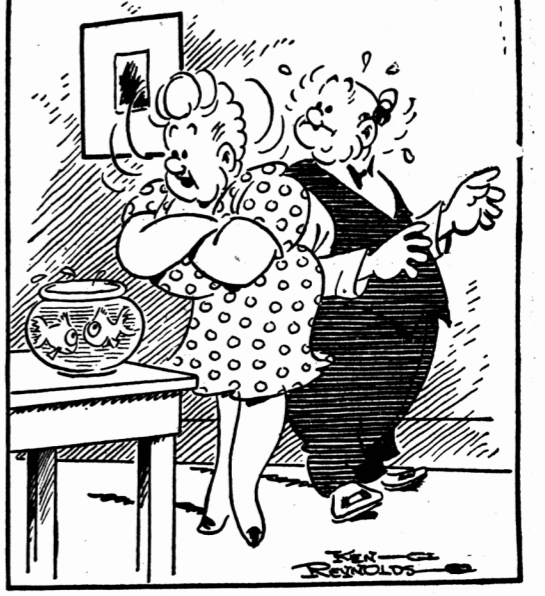
The United Party, now running the South African Government, led a drive to retain this "safe" seat, culminating its drive with five cabinet ministers speaking in the riding on the eve of the election, including Deputy Premier J. H. Hofmeyr.

The Nationalists set up an intensive drive with front-bench old stagers such as Eric Louw, formerly trade commissioner to France from the Union, taking part in the campaign.

The United Party won by 1,112 votes three years ago.

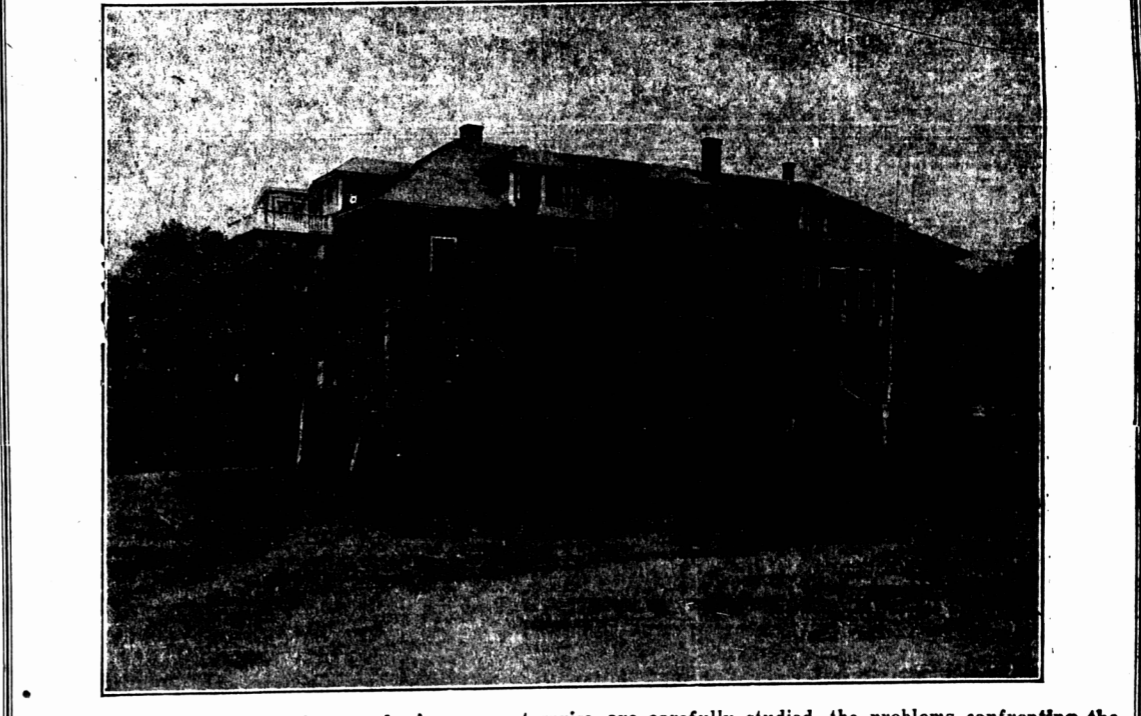
