HOW TORONTO STREET RY. WATCHES ITS CONDUCTORS.



There was no bidding for them in church, but several patterns were sold by Mr. Johnson Monday.

LICENSING BILL PASSED HOUSE.

LONDON, Nov. 23.—In a forcible and impressive speech in the House of Commons last week, which was listened to with respect by the audience and received enthusiastically by the Ministers and Laborites, Premier Asquith moved the third reading of the Licensing Bill. Messrs. Clavel and Slater and Earl Winterton moved its rejection. A division was taken amid much excitement and cries of "propriety" and "robbery, robbery," to which the Laborites reiterated, "snobbery, snobbery." The Bill was carried by a vote of 350 to 113.

Shrub, who returned to Boston this morning from Princeton University where the Harvard cross country team of which he is coach, ran in the intercollegiate cross country championship Saturday afternoon, said he was making his plans to return to England for the winter as he saw little prospect of making a match race with Tom Longboat, the Canadian Indian, on any terms that he considered fair.
