Will Electrify Oldest Railway

LONDON, Eng., Oct. 3. — The Mumbles Railway in the United Kingdom, is to be electrified. The railway was incorporated in 1804 and opened in 1807. For 70 years horse-drawn trains plied its 1.2 mile track, and for the last 50 years quick steam trains, still running on the open road for a considerable part of the route have carried on the service. Electrification of the line has long been discussed, and is now to be undertaken by the Swansea Improvement and Tramway Company in conjunction with the S.W. Electric Corporation. It is expected that the change will be completed by March.

Not Over-Confident

FINED FOR KILLING DEER

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 3. — The general impression that prospectors running short of food are entitled to shoot game at any time has been shown to be erroneous by a case recently heard at Merritt in which a Princeton man was convicted of killing a deer out of season. Bob Jameson, the man in question, pleaded that he and his partner were short of food, but the magistrate pointed out that the privilege of shooting game out of season was only accorded prospectors in unorganized territory. According to the act, "unorganized territory" consists of that portion of the province of British Columbia north of the 53rd parallel which passes somewhere near Quesnel. While refusing to accept a plea of ignorance of the law, the magistrate reduced the fine to a minimum of \$25.

Spanish Boxer Won From Sid Terris

NEW YORK, Oct. 1. — Hilario Martinez, hard punching Spanish lightweight, scored his second round victory over Sid Terris, crack New York title contender, in the feature match at the Queensboro Stadium. Terris was knocked down for three counts in the second round and barely kept his feet under Martinez's merciless attack in several others.

Schoolgirls' Perilous Adventure

(By British United Press) BERLIN, Oct. 3. — As the darkness of a stormy evening closed over the hill-locked waters of the Mondsee, near Salzburg, the despairing cries of a woman's voice falling from the heights were faintly heard at a peasant's steading on the slopes above Saint Lorenz. Arming themselves with ropes, the farmer, his labourer, and a young student who happened to be in the house set out in the direction from which the shouts had come. A long and arduous climb through the darkness brought them about midnight to the craggy and desolate Saigraben.

Here, to their amazement, they found twenty-eight girls of from 6 to 14 years of age huddled together on the edge of a precipice soaked to the skin by the driving rain, chilled to the bone by the icy hill-top wind, and whimpering from fear and suffering. They were without adult escort. The mistress who had accompanied them on the outing had battled her way alone to a commanding height from which the lights of the valley were visible and summoned help by her cries, but had not been able to find her way back to her terrified flock. It was not until seven o'clock in the morning that her whereabouts was discovered and help could be sent to her.

Meanwhile all through the night the three men were kept busily at work extricating the cragbound girls from dangerous and difficult positions. To get them on to passable ground it was necessary to lower them one by one with ropes over the darkness over the face of the precipice. It was not till nearly three a. m. that the last girl, a child of six in his arms. Fortunately a hut not far from the scene of their adventure was found, and the party remained there until dawn made it possible for the exhausted girls to follow the path to the valley. The children were inmates of a holiday home in the town of Mondsee, who were out for an excursion with one of the teachers. Their unpleasant adventure is said to have been the result of false markings on a map which led them to a point in the Saugrahen where the only continuation of their path was an almost precipitous declivity rendered practicable for experienced mountaineers by iron stanchions driven into the rock. Here the party completely lost their bearings and could move neither forward nor backward.
