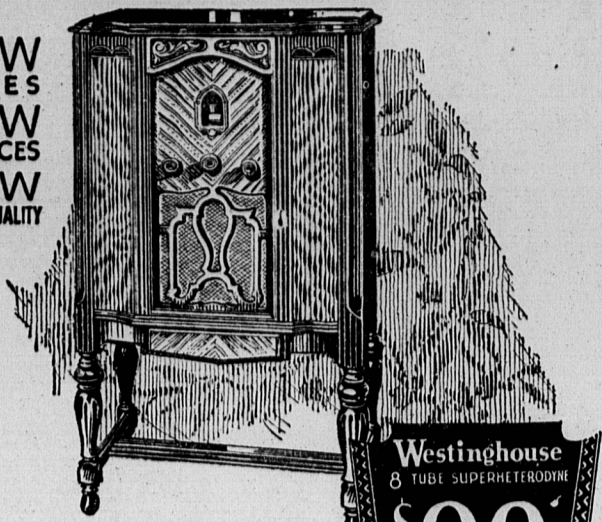
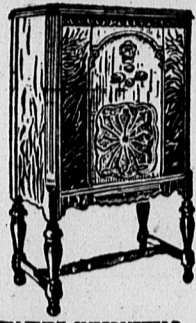

Gives Interview On Short Wave Radio Reception

In an interview with Mr. R. M. Legate, M.Sc. E.E., of The Radio Shop, on the subject of short wave reception, Mr. Legate said:

Short wave reception is still in its infancy, but it has opened up a field of radio entertainment undreamed of only a few years ago and today, though yet in its experimental stages, it has made available radio entertainment from almost every country in the world; it takes you "behind the scenes in Radio" and you hear the police broadcasts, amateurs speaking to each other across the continent, transatlantic telephone, and passengers at sea speaking to friends at home. The London Music Halls, Big Ben and the Empire News broadcasts are brought to your fireside; Spanish music from Madrid and Buenos Aires, opera from Rome and Berlin and programs from "Down Under" in Australia—all can be received in your own home in P. E. I.—under certain conditions. And last, but not least, it makes available to you the programs of the big American Stations—in the daytime—and very often at night, when weather conditions make your ordinary radio useless, the short waves will bring in your favorite program.

At this time of year London is heard best from 8.30 to 9.30 a. m. and from 2.30 p. m. to 4 p. m. Berlin is usually received with great volume and clarity from 9 a. m. to noon and Rome and Paris between 3 and 4 p. m. Central and South America are heard from 7 to 11 p. m. and the Westinghouse Short Wave Stations W8XX Pittsburg, and W1KAZ at Springfield, relaying the NBC programs can be heard at various times during the day. Although reception on the lower wavelengths is very little affected by atmospheric or static and good results may be had in mid-summer, even during a thunder-storm, the same is not true of man made interference. On the shorter waves, automobiles, electric appliances flashing signs, oil burners, etc., create far more interference than they do on the ordinary broadcast waves.

In spite of the foregoing limitations, foreign stations thousands of miles away will at times come in with a clarity and volume that will surprise you. In short, the short wave dial may at times yield nothing but code stations and at times you may mistake Station LSX at Buenos Aires for your local station.

The Westinghouse Co. have developed this year a short wave Radio Receiver which incorporates the latest developments in short wave reception and they have achieved simplification of operation never before attained. This instrument does not require the great amount of experience and skill in tuning previously necessary for operation of short wave receivers.
